# Democrats turn out for Obama

ntbetz@nwkansas.com Across Kansas Democrats turned out in record numbers for the Super Tuesday presidential caucuses, but a winter storm that dumped up to nine inches of snow held the numbers

down in the northwest part of the state. Tim Peterson, Senate District 40 caucus chair, said 34 people did manage to gather in Oakley on Tuesday, and a couple of people from as far north as Atwood made it.

"Despite the weather it was a real good turnout," Peterson said.

More than 37,000 Kansans turned out statewide for the caucuses. Unofficial totals showed 73 percent of Kansans Dems supported Barack Obama and 25 percent supported Hillary Clinton.

Peterson said the results were similar at the caucus in Oakley where 21 of those present supported Obama and 13 supported Clinton.

"We got down to the end and we had three groups of people that were not large enough to make the 15 percent level," Peterson said. "We had three minute speeches to sway those people to join one of the two main groups.

'We flipped a coin to see who would go first and the Obama person called 'tails.' It Heskett, Morland; Lori Krause, Marienthal; was heads and the Clinton person chose to go last.

"I felt the people were strong for Obama or strong for Clinton. The undecided people

went to Clinton.'

With the final figures Peterson said the groups elected six delegates to attend the First Congressional District Convention to be held in Hays on Saturday, April 12. Of the six four were for Obama and two for Clinton.

Statewide Obama won 313 of the state's 436 congressional district delegates with 123 going to Clinton. Based on the unofficial results Obama captured two thirds of the delegates that will be chosen through the congressional district conventions with the remaining going to Clinton.

The First Congressional District convention in Hays will elect two men and two women and one male alternate delegates to the Democratic National Convention to be held in Denver Aug. 25-28.

Seven at-large delegates plus one alternate will be elected at the state convention to be held in Topeka on May 10.

Delegates elected at the senate district caucus in Oakley included (Obama) Courtney Ress, Colby; LeAnn Simon, Studley; Kenneth Poland, Gem; and Len Schamber, Damar; (Clinton) Daniel Thornton, Oakley and Etta Walker, Sharon Springs.

Alternates elected included (Obama) Linda Aaron Feist, Sharon Springs; and Chris Sramek, Atwood; (Clinton) Skyler Huffman, Oakley and Carrie Griffin, Colby.

## Republicans to caucus in Colby on Saturday

gather at the Colby Community Building, 285 E. Fifth, (Little Theater) at 9 a.m. (Mountain Time) on Saturday to participate in the Kansas Republican Presidential Primary Caucus.

Sherman County Republican Chair Roxie Yonkey said she will be at the caucus in Colby to help the credential committee by checking in people from Sherman County. She said check-in begins at 8 a.m.

Yonkey said to participate in the caucus, a voter must have registered as a Republican, and be prepared to show a state-issued identification such as a driver's license.

Seven candidates were to be on the Kansas Republican Caucus ballot, but a few of those have dropped out - including an announcement Thursday by former Gov. Mitt Romney that he was suspending his campaign, - leaving four: Sen. John McCain, Rep. Ron Paul, former Govs. and Mike Huckabee, and Alan Keyes.

The Republican caucus is open to any

Republicans from northwest Kansas will registered Republican in the 1st Congressional District, Yonkey said. It is not limited to precinct committee members. Electioneering is encouraged. Voters may check in until the caucus starts. Between check-in and voting, the caucus will hear from the candidates or representatives of those who have entered the state caucus, Yonkey said.

After the speeches, voting will begin by secret ballot and results from individual counties will be tracked. Thomas County Clerk Shelly Harms and her deputy are in charge of tallying the votes, Yonkey said.

The overall statewide total will be announced around 5 p.m. (Mountain Time).

The results will dictate which presidential candidate the delegates from Kansas will support at the Republican National Convention in September, said Republican State Chairman Kris Kobach. In order to win the Kansas delegates, a candidate has to win the majority vote in two of the four Congressional Districts, he said.



Lulled into thinking of spring by the warm weekend weather winter showed up for a return engagement on Monday night. The Goodland Weather Service reported 8.3 inches of snow and 20 to 30 mph winds.

The winter storm moved in from the west and gradually moved on eastward, said the weather service. Before the snow started there was fog which gave the streets a slick coating underneath.

Tuesday morning the Goodland School District canceled school. Visibility in town at times was only a block. Most of businesses closed up shop early and let their people go home.

The interstate remained open but drivers slowed down. Troopers were kept busy with slide offs and accidents.

Goodland resident Virginia Yarbrough lost control of her vehicle five miles east of Brewster and overturned onto the drivers side, said the Kansas Highway Patrol. She was taken to Citizens Medical Center and released. Her vehicle was towed by Colby Wrecker.

The snow contained .41 inches of moisture, said David Thede a meterologist at the Goodland Weather Service.

will draw some of the top national cowboys who will compete and the top bulls for the riding stock.

He said the committee was adding \$10,000 to the purse to make it part of the PBR Enterprise Chute-Out Tour, and that it will be an event where cowboys can double the points. He said with the event in August some of the cowboys will
