It's important to know what to add

Most gardeners think they would do a soil tests only to find out what nutrients their yard or garden needs, but it's just as important to know if you have adequate

levels of nutrients so you don't add unneeded fertilizer.

The most basic soil test checks are pH and the levels of phosphorus and potassium. Most of the lawn and garden soil tests that K-State's lab see show more than adequate levels of both phosphorus and potassium minerals. If those nutrients are not needed, applying them is a waste of money and can be a source of pollution. In extreme cases, excess phosphorus can interfere with uptake of micronutrients.
