# Incumbents file for reelection

ntbetz@nwkansas.com State Sen. Ralph Ostmeyer and Rep. Jim Morrison told a group of citizens Saturday morning both will seek re-election this year.

Ostmeyer, a Grinnell Republican, said he has filed for re-election and hopes to serve one more term in the

"I have term-limited myself," he said. "Iserved eight years in the House and said I would serve two terms in the Senate if the people elect me.

"I am serious about this. I have 17 grandchildren and I want to take care of my family and enjoy them. I missed one of my grandson's last basketball games, and I don't want to keep doing that.

"I do want to serve another term, because we are going to be redistricting and I feel we can't lose another Senate seat to Johnson County. We need to look a how we determine the districts.

"In the '60s, the Supreme Court determined we had to have one-man,

one-vote, and that has diminished our power because we don't have the population. We have more infrastructure in roads, bridges and towns than some of the senators back east.
