Man beaten with chain club news while asleep Sunday

Free Press Reporter ackermanjk@ruraltel.net Colby police are asking for information about an incident involving a Sunday morning beating of a Colby man.

Brandon J. Helus, 20, of Colby was in bed at his home in the 1200 block of West Fifth Street when he was awakened by someone beating him with a metal chain, said Detective Sergeant Gary Shull today.

"We got the call at 10:25 a.m. about the incident which allegedly took place at 10:20 a.m.," Shull said. "Mr. Helus' roommate, Tyson A. Plumisto, 21, heard the incident and went into Mr. Helus' bedroom."

Shull said by the time Plumisto entered Helus' bedroom, Helus and the unidentified male suspect were fighting when Plumisto broke it 460-4460.

"The suspect fled and got away," Shull said.

As of this morning, he said, the identity of the suspect had not been verified, but had been narrowed down to three people.

Shull said the beating may be related to a previous incident involving Helus, but officers were working on connecting the two cases. He said although Helus received facial wounds from the beating, he declined medical treatment due to financial reasons.

"A red late 1990s model of a Dodge Durango was seen leaving the scene of the incident," Shull said.


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
