
# Debt stress syndrome: Do you have it?

## Grasshoppers abundant, problem matters of record

Grasshoppers seem to be abundant this year, and control can be a problem as they mature.

Young nymphal stages are much easier to control than adults, and also are much less mobile. One control option for home owners is Permethrin, sold under (numerous trade names). It's a good choice for gardens because it is labeled for a wide variety of vegetables. Keep in mind that hoppers can reinfest an area relatively quickly.

Many times gardeners have not had an insecticide failure, but a reinfestation. Acephate (Acephate, Ortho Systemic Insect Killer) may be the chemical of choice for larger hoppers. It has a longer residual activity and ability to move systemically within a plant. However, acephate is not labeled for many vegetables. It is labeled for roses, flowers, ornamentals, shrubs and shade trees.

Stopper and Grasshopper Attack. These products are selective and will affect only grasshoppers.

This is a trait that many gardeners find attractive. However, Nosema locustae products may not be as effective in garden situations as they would be under large-scale rangeland conditions due to potential reinfestations from outside the treated area. These products also have other potential disadvantages. They are most effective against nymphal rather than adult grasshoppers. Also, some grasshopper species are less susceptible than others. Kill can take 3 to 6 weeks after Gardeners are often interested in ingestion. These baits are perishable and should be kept refrigerated. Pay attention to the expiration date.
