# County to pick wonders

slcorcoran@nwkansas.com Get ready to nominate your favorite sites around Sherman County and vote for the county's 8 Wonders.

The Sherman County Convention and Visitors Bureau voted to spend \$500 to sponsor the promotion at its meeting Tuesday, splitting the \$1,000 cost with Sherman County Economic Development.

The Goodland Star-News and The Hays Daily News will do the program, which will be advertised in the Goodland paper, and on the Hays paper's web site.

Nominations will be taken for two weeks, said Star-News Editor Tom Betz, and then the Top 16 will be picked. Pictures and information on the 16 sites will be on-line and in the Goodland paper, he said, and votes to narrow it down to eight will be taken another two weeks. People can vote on-line or bring it into the news office, he said.

Once voting closes, Betz said, the ballots will be counted and a brochure made up that will be distributed from the paper office, the visitors bureau, economic development and the state Travel Information Center west of town. The wonders will also be featured in the newspapers, he said.

The selection will start once the \$1,000 sponsorship is paid, he said, which will probably be late August or early September, and will continue into October.

The Economic Development Council at first said they would approve paying half if the visitors bureau would pay the other half, Betz said, but then decided they would pay the full amount if the bureau didn't want to do it.

Donna Price, visitors bureau director, explained the program to board members and passed around a brochure that was printed for WaKeeney's 8 Wonders of Trego

"We would have our names on the brochure as sponsors," she said, adding they would also get 1,000 brochures to distribute. Price said she would ask if she could get

The newspaper will sell advertising for the back of the brochure, she said, and handle the web site and marketing, including advertising in the paper.

This will foster pride in the county, she said, and help people see the importance of the things that are nominated as wonders.

"I think people aren't aware of what there is here," said Helen Dobbs, office manager for economic development. "I grew up in Wallace County and didn't go to Mount Sunflower until I was an adult. I didn't go to Pike's Peak until I left that area.'
