In the fist quarter the Cowboys were outmatched with enthusiasm, but after Pearson


Holcomb scored on a 19-yard pass on returned the punt for the third Goodland score the momentum was captured and was never given up.

The varsity team played Tuesday at Lakin in a quad and went 3-0 and on Thursday they played in a duel at Norton and went 3-0.


