

Mavericks fall to Western Wyoming in dual

First dual held at Keirns center

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The first college wrestling dual held at Keirns Fitness Center on Tuesday was not a good depute for the Northwest Tech Mavericks as they lost 39-12 to Western Wyoming Community College.

A small crowd nearly filled the bleachers of the Keirns Fitness Center to watch the first college wrestling dual to be held in Goodland.

Coach Steve Lampe said he was glad to see the crowd out on a frigid cold night, but was disappointed in the performance of his wrestlers.

He said he felt they had too much Christmas vacation and were a bit out of shape. He said the Western Wyoming team was good, but thought some of his wrestlers should have won.

The Mavericks will be on the road Saturday for an all-day tournament at the Minnesota West Community College in Worthington. The team will travel to Rock Springs, Wyo. for a rematch on Tuesday.

Tuesday's dual in Goodland was the only time the wrestlers will be in action at home, and is the second home dual of the season. The Mavericks will be in Colorado Springs on Wednesday, Jan. 26, for a rematch with the Air Force Prep wrestling team who were the first opponent for the Mavericks at Max Jones on Oct. 29.

The Mavericks will be in the Kansas Cup that includes all Kansas college teams on Sunday, Jan. 30 at Gross Memorial Coliseum at Fort Hays State University.

Tuesday the Mavericks only scores came from Alex Akers at 125 pounds and Ricky Valdez at 285 pounds because those two weights were open for Western Wyoming.

Maverick Danny Floyd at 133 pounds lost a 3-1 decision to Richard Serna.

Maverick Chad Kochenower at 141 pounds lost by fall 4:07 to Markus Serna.

Maverick Dault Aliev at 157 pounds lost an 8-2 decision to Scott Verner.

Maverick Caleb Crump at 165 pounds lost by fall to Dylan Bushby.

Maverick Lorenzo Delgado at 174 pounds lost a 6-4 decision to Shawn Seppala.

Maverick Taylor Wuthnow at 197 pounds lost by fall to Simas Norkus.

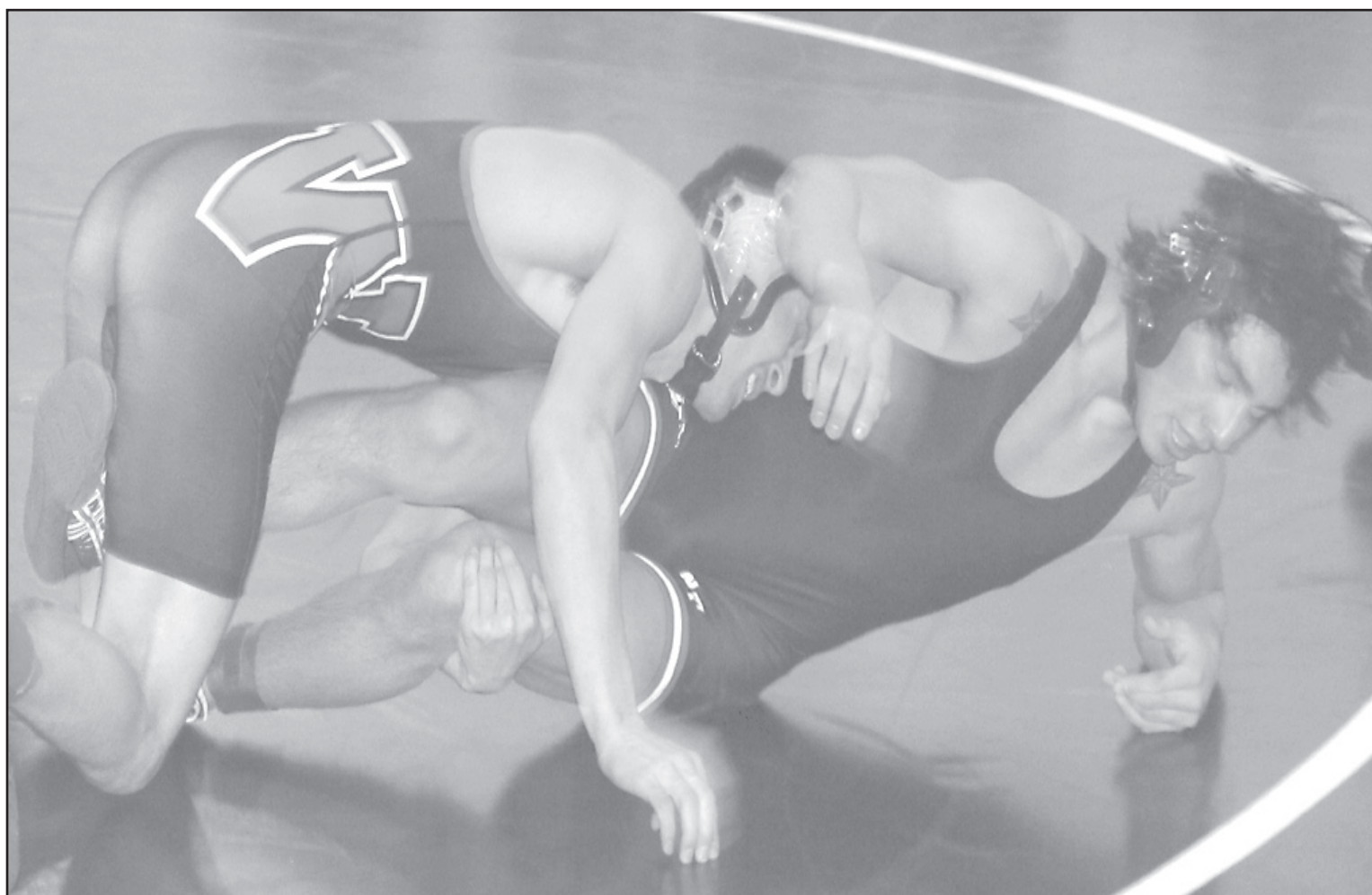
The Mavericks had opens at 149 pounds and 184 pounds to give Western Wyoming another 12 points.

Coach Lampe had a long conversation with his team after the dual, and said he expected better practices and performance in the upcoming matches.

In several of the matches the Mavericks were able to get an early lead in the first or second period, but were unable to overcome scoring efforts by the Western Wyoming wrestlers in the final period.

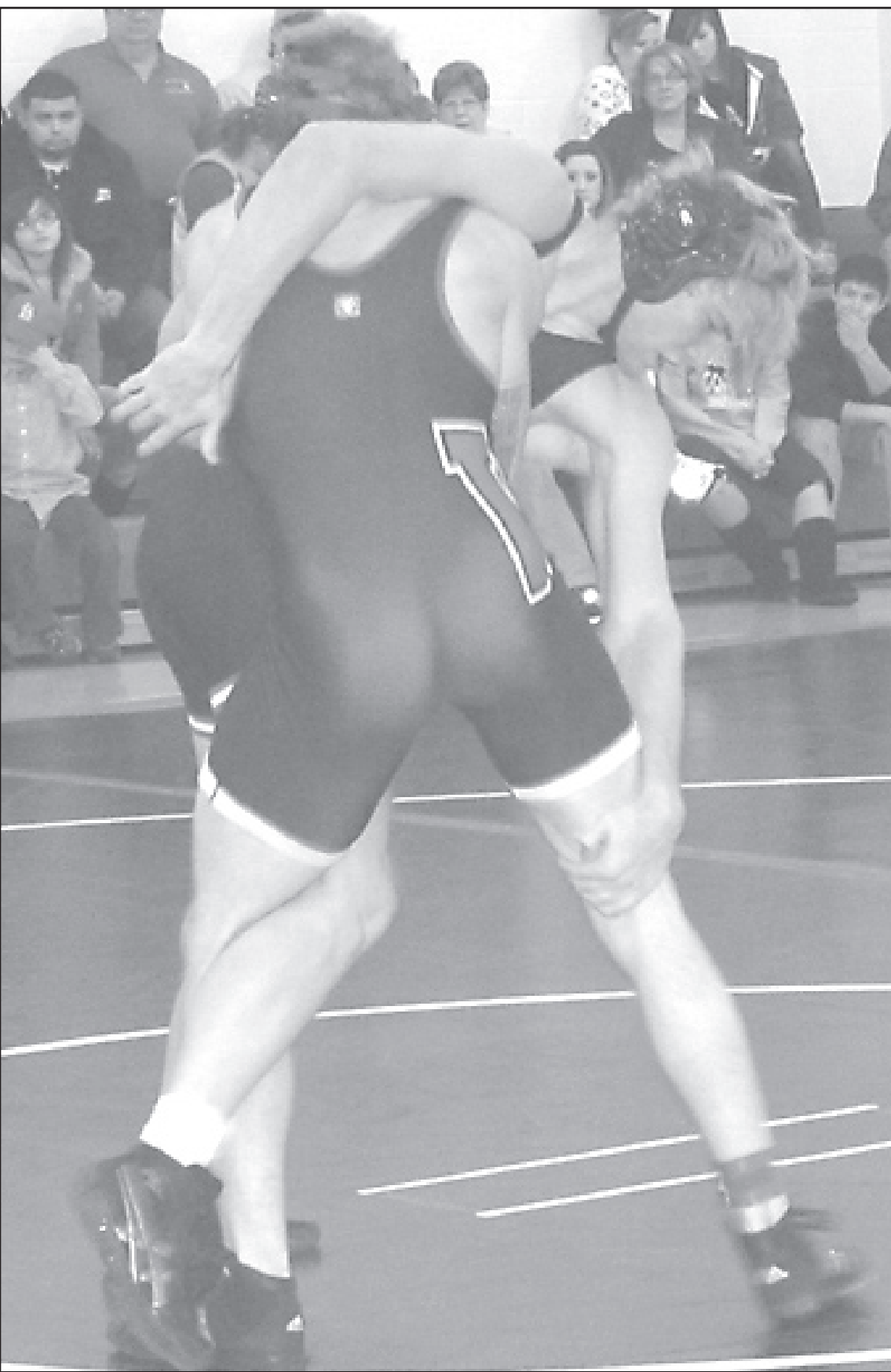
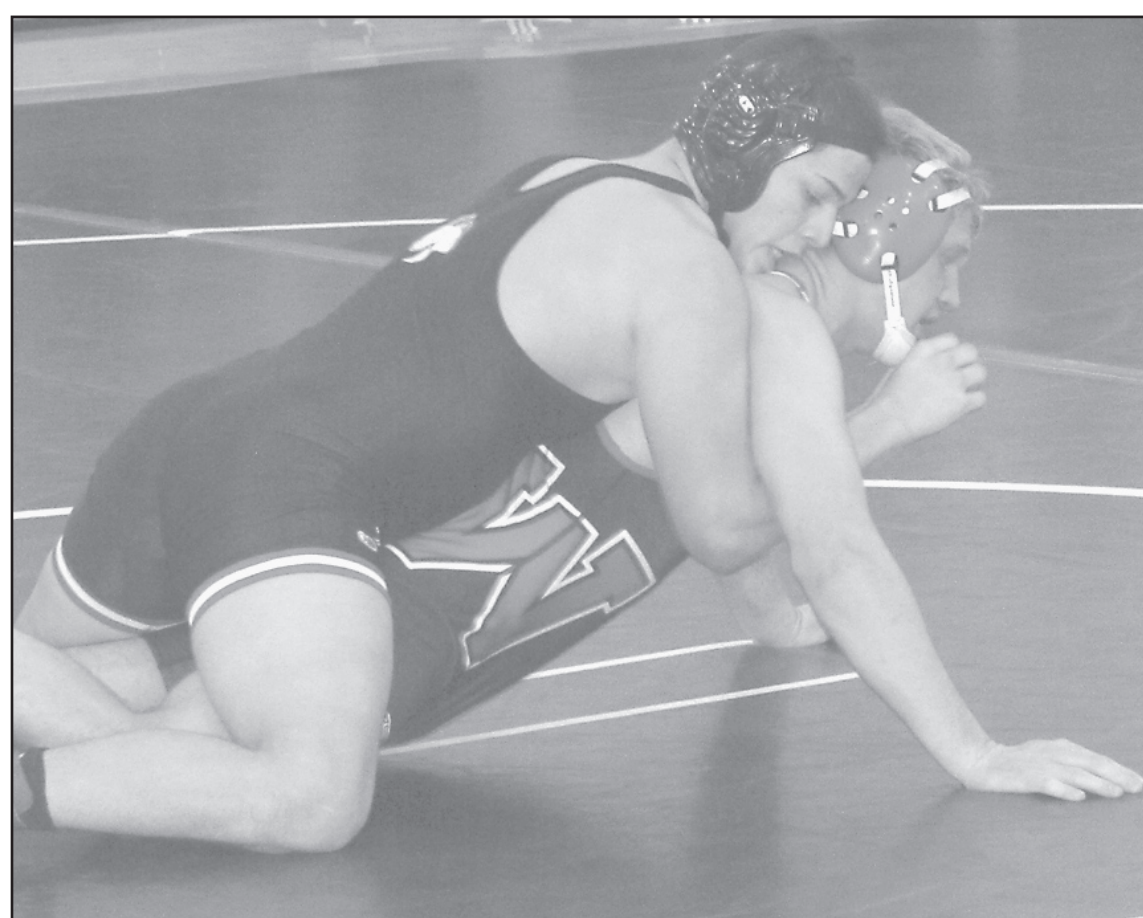
Bill Finley, college vice president of student affairs, acted as the announcer and welcomed the audience to the dual.

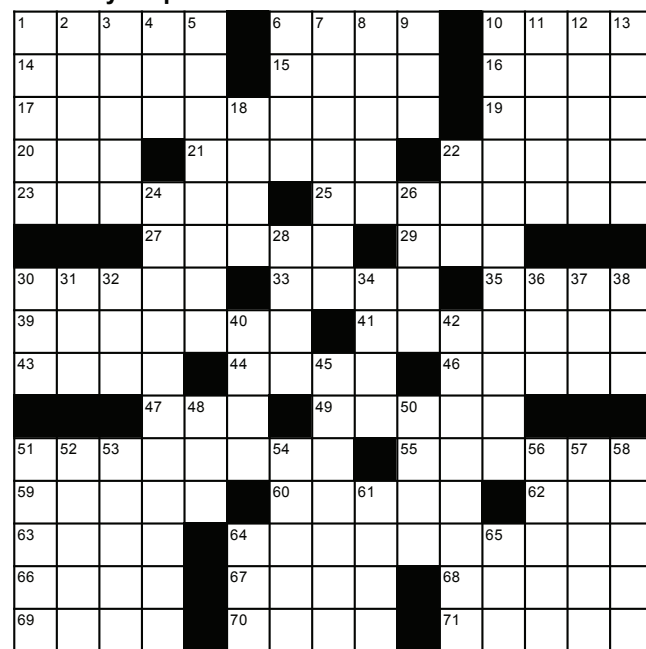


Crossword Puzzle
