

Good crowd for kick-off, fair

nt.betz@nwkansas.com The annual Sherman County Health Fair and City Take Charge Challenge kick-off Saturday drew about 400 to the Northwest Tech campus with about 40 health related booths to provide people with information and give out blood test results.

Amy Thorson, co-chair of the Take Charge Challenge committee, said the booth had 178 enter the drawing, but she was sure more people had taken bags without signing up.

To date Goodland has had 1,900 switches of light bulbs for compact fluorescent light bulb to help people save energy and add a point in the Take Charge Challenge contest.

Goodland is competing for a prize of \$100,000 with Colby, Oakley, Hoxie and WaKeeney and the contest runs from January through September.

When a citizen makes a light switch to a CFL they can go to the web site at http://takechargekansas. org and register on the Goodland page to help build points for the city. If a person does not have an e-mail address they can bring the switch information to Thorson or Shauna Johnson at the city and they can post it on line.

Tina Goodwin, director of marketing and volunteer services for Goodland Regional Medical Center, said she had done a quick count and had 420 people register, but felt the crowd was around 450, which is a little more than last year.

The blood profiles taken two weeks ago were available and Goodland Family Health Center physicians were on hand to review the results. Goodwin said 670 people went through the blood draw process, and those people who did not pick up their results or leave an envelope need to stop by the lab and pick up their results.

She said the blood test results do not "automatically" get sent to the doctors as many people assume.

"I was very pleased with the turn out," Goodwin said, "particularly with the wide variety of healthcare booths represented. Booths came from all over the state \Box Kansas City, Wichita, Hays and Garden City. The KU Medical Center free screenings were very successful. "I am grateful to Northwest Tech for the use of their facilities and the great volunteers from the school who helped with the event. It's the perfect place for an event like this.



Frigid cold descends

on area

Weather forecasters are warning that temperatures will be extremely cold today with a high near 1 with a wind chill as low as -36 and a low around -16 with wind chills at -38. There will be blowing snow with winds coming out of the north at 20 to 25 mph and gusts as high as 35 mph. There is not expected to be a large accumulation of snow.

The extreme cold started on Monday with temperatures falling throughout day to 8 and wind chills at -11. The low was around -10 with wind chill around -33.

Wednesday will have a high near 8 and a low around -1. By Thursday the high will be 30.

The National Weather Service has issued a wind chill warning starting at 5 p.m. Monday till 11 a.m. on Wednesday.

The cause of the extreme cold is that air from the Artic is following the mountains down, said Pam Murray, an intern meteorologist for the weather service. The temperatures and wind speed increase heat loss to people and animals get colder faster causing frost bite, she said.

"People need to stay inside," she said."If they need to go outside they should be sure to bundle up with hands and faces covered."
