Mavericks place 3 at Kansas Cup

The Northwest Tech Mavericks placed three of five in the Kansas Cup wrestling tournament held in Hays on Sunday where all eight Kansas college and university wrestling programs competed.

The Mavericks, shorthanded due to injuries and dropouts, represented quite well said Coach Steve Lampe as Caleb Crump 165 placed third, Taylor Wuthnow placed fifth at 197 and Lorenzo Delgado at 174, former Goodland Cowboys wrestler, placed sixth in his first ever college tournament.

The Mavericks had the final dual of the season Thursday in Pueblo. The next big event is the National Qualifying tournament for the West Central Region on Saturday, Feb. 12 in Powell, Wyo. The final event of the Mavericks first season is Feb. 24-25 for the National Junior College Athletic Association National Championships in Spokane, Wash.

Individual results
Alex Akers – 125 – lost his first match in a technical fall 19-2 in 6:05 against the No. 2 seed Jesse Barber of Pratt Community College. Akers lost his second match in a 4-0 decision to Rory Wilkinson of Fort Hays State University.

Daulet Aliev – 157 – lost at 10-4 decision to the top-seeded wrestler Derek Koehn of FHSU. Aliev lost his second match in a 1-0 decision to Trent Hoover of Neosho County Community College.

Caleb Crump – 165 – won his first match over the No. 2 seed Ryan Spencer of Newman University in a fall. Crump lost at 5-2 decision in the semifinals to the No. 3 seed Jakob Price of Baker University. Crump defeated Randal Clemens of Pratt in a 14-6 decision to advance to the third place match. He defeated the No. 4 seed Kyle Buckley of Labette in a 7-5 decision to take third.

Lorenzo Delgado – 174 – lost his first match to the No. 3 seed Gage Martin of Labette by fall in 3:31. Delgado won his second match in a 12-5 decision over Edwin Gutierrez of Neosho County. He lost his next match to Aaron Berscheid of FHSU in an 11-1 major decision. Tracer Hudson of Pratt defeated Delgado by a Major decision 9-1 in the fifth place match.

Taylor Wuthnow – 197 – lost his first match to Malcolm Norris of FHSU by fall 7:52. He won his second match in a 7-3 decision over Brandon Smith of Pratt. He lost the next match in an 8-1 decision to Jacob Cole of Newman. Cole went on to take third place. Wuthnow defeated Jon Arnold of Neosho County in a 6-4 decision in the fifth place match.

Northwest Tech signed another female golfer, and the first two male golfers to the Maverick's golf team last week.

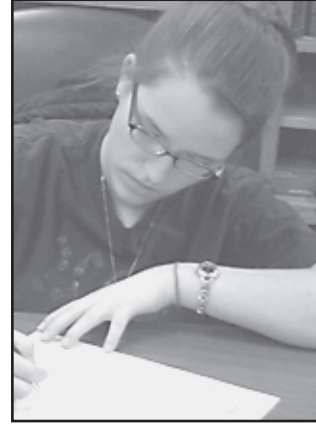
Northwest Tech Mavericks Golf Coach Travis Jones accept-

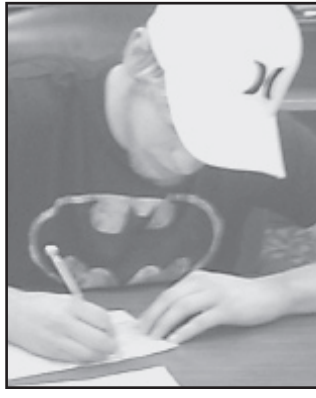
"We have made history once again at Northwest Tech," Jones said. "We accepted a letter of intent from our first male golfer."

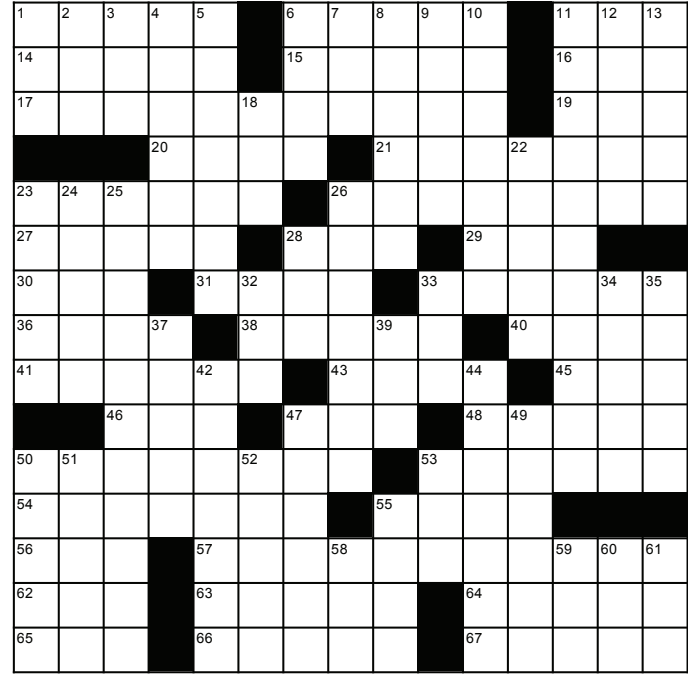
