City Public Works Director Rich Simon told the commissioners the grader was working the four inches of snow on Jan. 10 when the blade hit a valve riser on Caldwell Ave. Simon said the grader has been temporarily repaired, but the parts to fix it right would be about \$7,000, and he was told the value of the 1977 grader is about \$5,500.

Simon said he had contacted Murphy Tractor and had a mechanic come to help with the repairs. He said Ron McFarland, salesman is the one who said the old grader was worth about \$5,500.

He said McFarland said he knew of a 2009 John Deere that was in warranty in Springfield, Mo., and had been one purchased originally from Kansas Department of Transportation in Salina.

Simon said he had gotten information on two Caterpillar graders a used 2006 with 1,700 hours and a new one. He got the price on a new

commissioners he felt the option a salvage price, and feels the old one Simon was recommending was the best for the city.

Commissioner John Garcia asked about the older grader and if it was if the city kept the old one it would the only one the city has.

Simon said the 1977 John Deere is the oldest and the other is a 1984 that was purchased through KDOT.

Garcia asked about how many hours the city puts on the graders not counting the snow plowing.

Simon said it is about 300 hours a year. He said the one the city has 4,500 hours.

Garcia asked about an extended warranty and McFarland of Murphy Tractor said it would be possible to to Goodland before making that add two more years for \$3,180. He said the company has a service tech who lives in Colby.

Commissioner Kevin Rasure asked if the price included getting the grader to Goodland.

Simon said that is a delivered price.

Gerber said he agreed and that probably just sit around.

Simon said he would not be confident enough to keep it or take it to a sale. He said he would be concerned about the grader breaking down and the city being blamed.

Garcia made the motion to approve the purchase and seconded by Commissioner Annette Fairbanks. Garcia suggested buying the extended warranty, but Simon said he would rather get the grader decision

The vote was 5-0 and the grader is expected to be delivered in about 10 days.

In other business the commissioners:

• Approved a bid from Miller's Home Center for \$4,973 to replace Miller's bid.

• Approved an ordinance for low income utility rates. The ordinance is similar to previous ones approved by the commission, Gerber said. The ordinance sets a low income utility rate for homes with an annual income of \$15,000 or less. Homes with the low income would be eligible for a rate that is 15 percent lower than the current city water rates, and there is no meter charge for the low income customers.

Gerber said it is a potential cost of about \$2,200 for a year for electric and water.

Rasure asked what the income level had been before. Gerber said it has been \$13,000

and the recommendation was to raise it to \$15,000.
