material from freezing. He said there is a heater in the big room, but apparently is not working.

William McKnight, maintenance supervisor, said all the heaters are on a service card with Black Hills Energy and suggested having the gas company come check out all the heaters.

Griffith said he does not need a lot of heat, but it has to stay above freezing. He said in the cold of winter the room could get down to about 35 degrees.

"I don't want to try to save money by moving and then spend more on the new location," Strnad said.

Griffith said he did not feel it would be that expensive, but agreed it might be better to find a smaller heater to keep the temperature

above freezing.

He said for the other two doors that can be taken care of, but a requirement of the fire chief was to allow the barber shop people to be able to get out in an emergency.

Commissioner Larry Enfield asked if the plan would be acceptable for the county insurance carrier and if there was a liability

Strnad said the county does need to notify the insurance company about the move.

Enfield asked if that would change the insurance rates.

Griffith said he did not see how the county would be spending more money with the move.

Enfield asked if the county got paid for the collection.

Griffith said the expenses come out of the landfill. He said the county

pays an administrative fee as a satellite of Hays of about \$500 a year plus the disposal cost. He said the county does three collections a year and then hauls the barrels to Hays.

Griffith said the collections are done free by the county to keep the materials out of the landfill, and on the basis the county is collecting an annual landfill fee on all the property owners in the county.

Rumpel said she had called the county insurance carrier about the move and was told the only thing they would need is the new address and a list of replacement cost of any

Commissioner Max Linin said that was his concern and with the word from the insurance company was in support of making the move. He suggested Griffith get started on getting the ventilation fans.

• Heard a report the Legislature has proposed putting the counties back under a tax lid, and passing term limits for county commissioners. Strnad said the tax lid would limit the money the county could raise.

County Clerk Janet Rumpel said the

state used to have a limit on each fund, but went to a percentage increase where the commissioners had to pass a resolution to raise the taxes.

Strnad said the proposal would limit the total dollars, and if the county valuation increased the money would go to Topeka and not be of any benefit locally.

The commissioners will meet at 8 a.m. on Monday, Feb. 28, at the commission room on the main floor of the Sherman County Courthouse, 813 Broadway Ave.

CHARTER ORDINANCE NO. 1-2010

A CHARTER ORDINANCE EXEMPTING THE CITY OF KANORADO, KANSAS FROM K.S.A. 15-204 AND SUBSTITUTING PROVISIONS REGARDING THE APPOINTMENT OF CITY OFFICERS.

WHEREAS, The City of Kanorado, Kansas is authorized to exercise the powers, functions and duties of a city of the third class, including home-rule powers in the manner, and subject to the limitations, provided by Article 12, Section 5 of the Constitution of the State of Kansas hereby elects to and does exempt itself and make inapplicable to it K.S.A. 15-204, which applies to this city, but is part of an enactment that does not apply uniformly to all cities.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF KANORADO. KANSAS:

The City of Kanorado, Kansas by the power vested in it by Article 12, Section 5 of the Constitution of the State of Kansas, hereby elects to and does exempt itself from and make inapplicable to it the provisions of K.S.A. 15-204 which applies to this city, but is part of an enactment that does not apply uniformly to all cities and hereby provides substitute and additional provisions in place thereof which follows:

Section 1-301: At the first regular meeting in May of each year The Mayor, by and with the consent of the council, shall appoint the following City Officers, to-wit: a Municipal Judge of the municipal court, a City Attorney, law enforcement officers and any other such officers as deemed necessary for the best interest of the City. Such appointed Officers shall hold a term of office of one year and until their successors have been appointed and qualified.


Section 1-302: The Mayor, by and with the consent of the council, shall have authority to hire at-will such employees as the City Clerk, City Treasurer, City Maintenance and all other employees as deemed necessary for the best interest of the city.

PUBLICATION: This Charter Ordinance shall be published once each week for two consecutive weeks in the official City newspaper.

EFFECTIVE DATE: This is a Charter Ordinance and shall be effective on the sixty-first (61st) day after publication, unless a sufficient petition for a referendum is filed and referendum is held on this Charter Ordinance as provided in Article 12, Section 5, Subsection (c)(3) of the Constitution of the State


