## Cowgirls even record with win

The Cowgirls are third in the Great Western Activity Conference with a 4-4 record and at 5:30 p.m. tonight play the Scott City Lady Beavers (6-12) who are fourth in league with a 4-5 record at Max Jones Fieldhouse. Friday the Cowgirls play the final regular season game at Max Jones against the Ulysses Lady Tigers (3-15).

At Hugoton things did not look good for the Cowgirls in the first quarter as they fell behind 6-0 before Jade Herl hit her first 3-point basket to make it 6-3 half way through the quarter. That was all the scoring Goodland had as the quarter ended with Hugoton leading 8-3.

"We got off to a really slow start," said Coach Andy Scheopner, "but our defense kept us in the game. We played much better in the second

Neither team was on a hot scoring streak as the Cowgirls shot 24.3 percent for the game, but the Lady Eagles were ag 16.2 percent. The Cowgirls tried to be patient

with their offense doing a lot of passing and trying to get inside shots, but the Lady Eagles inside defense was good. Cowgirl M'Lynn Hinger hit a

basket to start the second quarter to cut the lead to 8-5, and hit two free throws with under five minutes left to narrow the lead to 8-7. Herl hit one of two free throws

with 3:49 left to tie the score at 8-8, and with two minutes left another free throw gave the Cowgirls the lead 9-8 in the low scoring contest.

The Cowgirls extended the lead on a basket by Hinger with about one minutes left to lead 11-8 at

Herl helped extend the lead in the third quarter hitting two 3-point shots to help the Cowgirls take control and lead 17-8.

Paige Phillips had two free throws to make it 19-8 and a 15 point run for the Cowgirls before the Lady Eagles got a free throw to break the scoring streak at 19-9 with six minutes left

Cowgirl Ashley Archer missed two free throws, and with 3:49 left had a 3-point shot miss.

Hugoton got a basket to make it 20-11 with about three minutes left. Both teams were playing tough defense, and there was lots of scraping for the ball with the Cowgirls having 17 turnovers and 15 for Hugoton.

With under two minutes left Herl got a lay up to make it 22-11.

Hugoton scored with 20 seconds left to cut the lead to single digits at 22-13.

Hugoton was no match for the rolling Goodland Cowboys on Friday night as the Cowboys beat the Eagles, 57-40.

Donald Raymer and the boys pick up their 10th win of the year as their record now stands and 10-8 after adding a fourth straight victory.

The Cowboys face the Scott City Beavers (17-1) at 7 p.m. tonight in the Max Jones Fieldhouse. The Beavers demolished Goodland in the first game of the season, 72-29. Goodland is a completely different team and their efforts will be put to the test against Ron Baker and the Beavers.

The Beavers lead the Great Western Activity Conference with an 8-0 record, Holcomb is second at 6-3 and Goodland and Ulysses are tied for third at 5-3. The Cowboys will face the Ulysses Tigers at 7 p.m. on Friday at Max Jones in the final regular season game.

After halftime the Cowboys and Eagles traded punches in the third quarter, but Goodland was just a little bit better. The offensive flow was too much for Hugoton to stop and the score was 42-34 going into the fourth.

Goodland at times has had trouble putting teams away and finishing out games, but this time they put the Eagles to bed. The Cowboy defense only allowed 6 fourth quarter points to make the final score 57-40.

The Cowboys received most of their scoring from Ryan Hillmer and Robert Cowan, who both had 17. Garth Helton put in 6 as well as Brock Wilkens. Dillon Trachsel had 5 points, Taylen Smith and Blaine Luther had 2, and Hazen Deeds and Parker Sieck had 1.


