Cowboys face Monarchs tonight

nt.betz@nwkansas.com The Cowboys open sub state play at 6 p.m. tonight at Max Jones Fieldhouse against the Thomas More Prep Monarchs.

Goodland and Thomas More Prep had the same 10-9 records when the sub state brackets were drawn on Wednesday, but the Cowboys had a tie-breaker over the Monarchs having defeated them 46-40 on Jan. 17 at Hays.

The Monarchs have an 11-9 record after defeating Trinity of Hoisington 37-34 on Friday.

Friday the Cowboys evened their record at 10-10 with a 56-41 loss to the Ulysses Tigers in the final Great Western Activity Conference game of the regular season finishing with a 5-4 league record.

After winning five games in a row the Cowboys lost the last two of the regular season to Scott City and Ulysses. Even with the losses the Cowboys are ahead of the 4-14 record of last year, and a win tonight would give them a chance to improve to 11-10. The winner of tonight's game will travel to Larned on Friday to face the winner of the Scott City (18-1) and Larned (4-15) game tonight at Scott City.

Coach Donald Raymer started five seniors on Friday with Hazen Deeds getting a start along with Brock Wilkens, Dillon Trachsel, Garth Helton and Robert Cowan.

Ulysses started juniors Braden Langston, Garrett Kissell, Kyle Zerr and Josh Jarnagin plus senior Chris Oliver.

The Cowboys hit 33 percent from 3-point range (4-12), 21.6 percent from the floor (8-37), and 76.5 percent of the free throws (13-17).

The Tigers out rebounded the Cowboys 35-28. The Tigers hit 20 percent of 3-point shots (3-15), 51.6 percent from the floor (16-31), and 65.2 percent of free throws (15-23).

Zerr led the Tigers with 15, Oliver 12, Kissell 10, Langston 9, Newell and Jarmigan 5 each.
