pjschiefen@nwkansas.com The Goodland School Board heard from Superintendent Shelly Angelos on Monday night at the regular school board meeting that the district would be getting cut \$49,000 in the base state aid from the state. Superintendent Angelos said she is expecting at least one more cut this year in state aid. That money goes into the general fund used for operations.

The outlook for next fall is a \$157 cut on each full time equivalency or \$428,180 less in base state aid in the general fund. The legislature is talking about another \$40 cut to fund special education. That would be \$492,496 less for the general fund.

Superintendent Angelos said that with the help of the staff she would

Board member John Hendrich asked how may teachers it would take to make up the difference. Superintendent Angelos said on the average a teacher cost \$50,000 to \$60,000. So Hendrich said that figured out to be about eight teachers.

"It looks bleak," said Superintendent Angelos.
