Incentives approved for Motel 6

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Motel 6 has reopened under new management, and asked the city commission to approve some economic development incentives, and at the meeting on Monday the commissioners agreed to a six month utility credit and waiving connection and permit fees.

City Manager Doug Gerber said in the future he would have Michael Solomon, economic development director, handle these requests to give him a chance to review the proposals.

Solomon said the direct impact of the Motel 6 reopening is jobs in the community. Solomon said the owners Arvind (Ed) Patel, president of A&S Properties of California, and Bharat (Brett) Maru, vice president of operations are planning a major upgrade for

Solomon said some of those jobs are people gram for the motel upgrade. He said the first

would have about 15 jobs with an average hourly wage of \$10 an hour.

He said A&S Properties owns 45 hotels and motels, and has put about \$350,000 into the hotel to get it reopened because of major heating and air conditioning problems found after the motel had been closed.

Solomon said the owners continue to deal with some of that as they work to convert the rooms to individual heating and air conditioning units. He said Motel 6 is requiring a major upgrade to the rooms, and the owners expect this to be about \$400,000.

He said Motel 6 wants it done by next year, but Patel has asked for an extension to give them a bit more time to get this one done. Solomon said the owners have said they would try to use local people where possible.

in the home office. He said the local motel thing is trying to get the motel reappraised. was \$3,000 what it is today? Solomon said A&S paid quite a bit less than the \$760,000 of the listed appraisal, and the revitalization project is to rebate property tax for an increase of appraised value.

The motel has been reopened for about a month, and Solomon said the city utility records show the average monthly bill was \$3,000 when it was open before. He said the owners plan to have 68 rooms taking some of the original 84 and making them into suites.

He said the Motel 6 owners would like to ask the city for a 12 month credit on their utility bill along with the waiver of connection and permit fees.

He said he knows the city has granted a six month credit on utilities, but the Motel 6 owners were asking the city to consider 12 months with all the repairs they have had to make.

City Clerk Mary Volk said the connection fees have been refunded, and so far the motel has not applied for a building permit.

Mayor Josh Dechant asked if the utility bill

Solomon said he is not sure as they motel has only been open for about a month.

Commissioner John Garcia said he did not see a way at this time to base the utility

Dechant said it is probably premature on the six months, and felt the city has set a precedent with the six months. He said they told the owners they would wait until the motel was more functional.

Solomon said the owners would prefer the six months start now.

Gerber said he had suggested they use a date in the future to start the six months.

Commissioner Dave Daniels said the city would wait a year and give the six months back as an average. He said he feels the six months is a precedent.

Commissioner Annette Fairbanks said she agreed on the six months, but said the policy

City commissioners passed five resolutions setting a hearing date

at 5 p.m. on Monday, April 18, for homes that need repaired or demolished as part on the ongoing effort to improve the housing conditions in the city. Hearings are scheduled for a

possible plans for demolition. Over the past few years the city has been working with homeowners to clean up vacant houses. The city has given homeowners time to work on improving the houses, and when no action has been taken the city has put out bids to have the homes demolished.

City Manager Doug Gerber said a recent condemnation of the house at 215 N. Main is in dispute by the homeowner. The city put out a bid to demolish the home, but Gerber said the owner had been on the phone and said he was unaware he was to stay in contact after the city gave him 90 days to get repairs started.

City Building Inspector and Fire Chief Brian James said he had sent all the homeowners certified letters and knew they had been received. He said of the five set for hearing he knows there is a lien holder on the one at 910 W. 17th.

Gerber said he told the owner of 215 N. Main he needs to get the city a written plan of his repairs, and Gerber said he will put the demolition of that property on the bottom of the list. He said he expects the owner to be at the commission meeting on Monday, March 21.



Commissioners ask for bids on weed mowing

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Sherman County is changing the way weeds will be mowed this summer, and the commissioners decided it would be good to look at bidding the program out.

The commissioners meet today, and were to look at specifications and miles for the mowing to put it out for bid.

In the past Darrel Schroder has been doing the weed mowing, but the commissioners decided last fall to change how many times the weeds are to be mowed in favor of more

Commissioner Cynthia Strnad said Schroder has been doing the mowing for several

years and it has not been put out for bid.

Commissioner Larry Enfield said he felt it should be put out for bid, but was concerned it was too late for this year.

Commissioner Max Linin agreed, and said he felt it could be done now because the county was not planning to mow until later in the summer.

Strnad said she thought Schroder was planning to do the mowing, but the county does not have a contract at this time.

She said she always thought it ought to go out to bid.

The commissioners agreed to get the specifications of how many time the roads are to be

mowed, how wide and how many miles today

and will check with Butch Vandiver, road and has recirculation pumps and Enfield said he felt bridge superintendent on the miles.
