Superintendent reviews issue

nt.betz@nwkansas.com The day of decision is getting close on the Goodland School district \$14.9 million bond issue, and Superintendent Shelly Angelos reviewed the issue for the city commissioners.

Angelos, accompanied by School Board members Chuck Wilkens and Gary Slough spoke to the city commissioners at their meeting on Monday, March 7. She reviewed the more than three year process the school board went through to reach the decision to ask voters to approve the bond issue to appear on the Tuesday, April 5, election.

She said the district has been elementary school. showing a continuing decline in students over the past 10 years, but is showing an increase this year because the Learning Center, which org/) give the information about has averaged 30 students, this year costs to the property owners. She said with the aging facilities the district is having difficulty maintaining all the buildings, and the funding challenges with cuts from the state are complicating the process.

Elementary and Grant Junior High would be about \$450,000 on an annual basis.

"This solution is not for today," she said, "but for the next 20 years and beyond.'

She said Goodland is not trying to keep up with the Jones', but said many of the surrounding school districts have upgraded and invested in the communities. She mentioned WaKeeney, Scott City \$14.7 million, Ulysses \$10.2 million, Dodge City for new high school, Hugoton \$22.8 million, Victoria \$3.4 million, Garden City \$97 million for new high school and Greeley County \$4.8 million to repair and remodel

She said the flyer and information available on the Goodland School District web site (www.usd352. said the average home in Sherman County is valued about \$65,000.

The \$14.9 million bond will include \$5.4 million in interest-free qualified construction bonds, and the school district has \$1.5 million for energy improvements at the high school. The interest-free bonds will save the district more than \$2 million, and state aid would be about 15 percent and another \$3.2 million in interest savings.

"I am asked 'Why now' and I believe it is time to address the needs of the future for our district and for the students," she said. "When I am asked 'What is Plan B,' I say we are living Plan B now.'

She closed her presentation by asking those present to at least vote.

"I am not saying which way to vote," she said.

Monday is the last day to register for the April 5, election. Early and advance voting will begin on Tuesday at the county clerk's office.
