

Cowboys split with Cougars, play Hugoton today

The Cowboys baseball team split a home doubleheader with the Burlington Cougars on Tuesday to bring their record to 4-2, and are in Hugoton today for a league matchup.

The Cowboys won the opening game 4-2, but lost the second game 17-8.

Cowboy Garth Helton was the starting pitcher for the first game, and Coach Devlin Mull said he pitched well, but did struggle at times. Helton pitched for six innings with six strike outs and walked three. He gave up two runs, in the top of the first on a double by Cougar Colin Eberhart and a rbi single by Blake Thomas.

Helton struggled a bit in the fifth inning walking Eberhart, but then got Cougar Max McKinster to hit back to the pitcher and Helton threw to Austin Avelar for the force at second and Avelar threw to Dallas DeLaRosa at first to get the double play and end the inning.

Helton got into a bit of a jam in the sixth inning and Coach Mull made his second trip to the mound to talk to his pitcher.

Helton had walked the leadoff Cougar Spencer Deines who advanced to second on a wild pitch and scored on a Cowboy error that put Thomas on second and scored the Cougars second run.

Helton got Cougar Austin Graff to hit to Avelar for an out. Helton gave up a single to Cougar Dylan Pralle to have runners on the corners with one out. Helton struck out Cougar Brad Rhoades for the second out and Cougar Chance Carlin was thrown out at first to end the threat.

Cowboy Ryan Hillmer came in to pitch the seventh inning and got two

quick outs and struck out McKinster for the Cowboys win.

The Cowboys had tied the score in the first at 1-1 when Hillmer scored after getting a base hit, advancing to third and scored on a sacrifice fly by Cowboy Ryder Kling.

The Cowboys added a run in the third inning on a triple by Avelar who scored on a passed ball to make it 2-1.

DeLaRosa scored in the fourth inning after getting a base hit and stealing second he advanced and scored on two wild pitches to make it 3-1.

Hillmer scored in the fifth to make it 4-1.

Catcher Kling had several great plays in the first game including a couple of pop ups behind the plate.

Coach Mull said Kling is an important spark for the team, and his energy and strong play are good for the team.

Kling had a double and a single in the first game and had two hits in the second game.

Mull said Avelar is one of his best hitters at this time with his triple in the first game and he had three hits in the second game.

Another Cowboy Mull said was hitting well is Reed Bellamy, but he will be losing him for a few weeks because Bellamy is on the track team.

Mull said he started freshman Taylen Smith in the second game, and he pitched three innings. Mull said he was pitching well, but when Smith gave up two walks in the fourth he felt it was time to bring in some relief.

Mull said Smith was pitching well, and he may have pulled him in too early, but did not want to wear the freshman out in his first appear-

ance.

Smith gave up two runs in the first inning, but pitched well until the top of the fourth.

Coach Mull said he brought in Gunner Helton who had some problems and gave up three more runs plus the two walks to give Burlington a 7-2 lead.

The Cowboys came back in the bottom of the fourth to tie the game at 7-7.

In the fifth Gunner Helton gave up two runs and Mull decided to bring in DeLaRosa. Mull said DeLaRosa is having some control problems

and gave up two walks. Mull then brought in Hillmer in to finish the game.

The Cowboys gave up four runs in the fifth, four in the sixth and one in the seventh to lose 17-8.

Mull said he doesn't know much about Hugoton except they are a young team. He said the Cowboys should have a good chance, and it is the second league match up of the season.

He said he heard Scott City split with Lakin, and that is good for the Cowboys in the league race.
