Dorn said the total cost of equipment to bring the fire truck up to the other \$1,200 will come from the rural fire board fund.

Dorn explained to Bauman what has to be added to the truck, and most of it is specific sized hose and some other equipment. Dorn thinks the added equipment can easily be stowed in one of the built-in compartments on the truck. He said the fire truck is a pumper truck and with the added equipment and hose should be ready to be tested to be certified as a Class A pumper.
