## June is the time to fertilize warm-season grasses

June is the time to fertilize warmseason lawn grasses such as bermuda grass, buffalo grass, and zoysia grass. In our area, we grow mostly buffalo grass in this category. These species all thrive in warmer summer weather. Thus, this is the time they respond best to fertilization. The most important nutrient is nitrogen,
