It has been a busy start of the summer season at Bonny Lake State Park. Campgrounds were full for the Memorial Day weekend with lots of boats and fishermen on the lake.

There have been a lot of questions about the park for this season. Currently, the plan is to operate the lake like last year with trailer-launched boating available until Labor Day.

Wagon Wheel and part of Foster Grove campground will again be available for camping. The Off-Highway Vehicle area in North Cove with its several miles of trails is open. Upper management is currently discussing turning the park into a state wildlife area after the summer, due to the anticipated lowering of the lake in the fall.

Activities this summer will include the Fourth Annual Dutch Oven and Chile Cook-off on Saturday, June 18. Entries are still open. Anyone who enjoys cooking with Dutch ovens is welcome to enter and have fun with fellow Dutch oven enthusiasts. 14,500 acre/ft and slowly rising. About a foot and a half higher than last year at this time. Anticipating levels to stay up until Labor Day. At the boat ramp the current depth is 4 to 5 feet and all boats are able to launch. A part-time ANS inspection station started operating in late May.

FISHING: Fishing for all species is good. Water temp is around 62 degrees during the day. A good number of decent-size white bass have been taken off the face of the dam with crankbaits (bass lures), shrimp and jigs. A good number of walleyes are being taken on nightcrawlers and crankbaits. A few catfish have been caught on typical baits. Division of Wildlife has approved the emergency fishing regulations.

There is no daily bag, possession or size limits on any game fish. Any taking over the bag or possession limit requires a form to be filled out when leaving the lake. Forms are available at the Visitor Center, Foster Grove and the northeast corner of the dam on self-serve signs.

BOATING: Lake is open for the summer to boating. Due to staffing reductions, boats can not be launched or operated at night on weekday nights (Sunday through Thursday). Current plan is to operate the park and the lake the same as last year with trailer launched boating available until Labor Day.

Off-road vehicle area has reopened. Off-road vehicles are not allowed to ride anywhere else other than the North Cove designated area. Registrations available from ranger or Visitor Center when open.

FIRE RESTRICTIONS: Fires allowed only in Wagon Wheel and Foster Grove campgrounds inside designated fire rings. No fires anywhere else. Propane grills and

CAMPING: Wagon Wheel campground is open and all sites have electric. The cost is \$20 per night. Wagon Wheel flush shower building HOSPITAL, from Page 1 and dump station open. Hospital gets better ratings from patients

who were admitted to a hospital.

Gaydusek said the patients are $asked\,when\,the\,staff\,person\,can\,call$ to make it easier on them.

Hooker said last year the percent who felt their care was OK or poor was 10 percent and has dropped to six percent for the first quarter.

She said another report of those returning to the emergency room in 72 hours was less than an average of one, and was a total of five patients in the quarter. She said the improvement shows the nurses more information to work with missioners reviewed changes in patients about what they need and the physician assistants and nurse practitioners are dealing with the Bonnie Selby regarding a potential patient's trauma or illness.

She said the decrease in return visits may be part of the follow-up calls process where the nurse opens the line of communication and the patient can get more questions an-

She said on patient safety measures, one patient had an infection in 100 days. She said five percent is the national average, and the hospital's was three percent for the quarter. She said January was zero and March was zero, but one patient was in February to give the hospital three percent for the quarter.

She said the Falling Star program is something the nurses implement when the patient first arrives. They


