Apparent explosive material found

nt.betz@nwkansas.com The original incident seemed fairly routine when law enforcement were called to a house at 537 W. 13th, about noon on Wednesday where a man reportedly had a gun, but that was the beginning of a long day that ended about 11 p.m.

The original incident was handled as a concern for the suspect who was considered suicidal, Police Chef Joni Showalter said Thursday.

Showalter said the call was about noon on Wednesday, and Matthew Krayca, 32, was taken into protective custody and taken to the Sherman County Bastille.

She said a number of guns were removed from the house, and she said two search warrants were obtained and executed.

She said the police officers found illegal narcotics and apparent explosive material. She said the police continue to gather in-

formation and take statements, and expects arrest warrants and charges to be filed once that process is complete.

The search began at noon and was completed about 11 p.m.

The Goodland Police were assisted by a special unit from the Kansas Highway Patrol and an Explosive Ordinance Disposal unit from Fort Riley.

Showalter said once the apparent explosive material was seen she called Fort Riley and the KHP for assistance.

"I put the Goodland fire department on standby and closed the street," Showalter said.

She said she brought in the ambulance and a city electrical employee and a representative from Black Hills Energy to be on standby.

"We went door to door in the neighborhood explaining what was happening," she said, "and telling people it was up to them if they wanted to evacuate.

"I told people if there was an increase in the apparent threat we would ask them to evacuate. My officers and I wanted to be sure the people were not in danger."

The KHP special unit flew a special dog in from Topeka and had another dog unit drive to Goodland.

Four members of a U.S. Army unit from Fort Riley arrived about 9:30 p.m.

The Goodland fire department set up a scene lights in front of the house and had two spotlights helping illuminate the scene. A large fluorescent type column light was
