

# Goodland swim team places second at Burlington, home meet Saturday

The Goodland Swim Team placed second with 240 points on Saturday at the Burlington Swim Meet. The team had 10 individual first place finishes and six relay team winners.

Goodland will host the swim meet on Saturday. League will be at the Colby pool on Friday and Saturday, July 8 and 9.

Dusty Johnson (11-12 boys) won all three of his races, 100-yard freestyle (1:12.79), 50-yard backstroke (38.04) and 50-yard breaststroke (41.87).

Taryn Bedore (15-18 girls) won all of her races 100-yard freestyle (1:05.83), 50-yard freestyle (27.79) and 100-yard butterfly (1:11.97).

Rachel Witman (9-10 girls) won the 25-yard backstroke (20.19) and Holton Witman (15-18 boys) finished first in the 100-yard butterfly (1:12.81).

Gerell Miller (13-14 boys) was a gold medal winner in the 100-yard backstroke (1:17.37) and placed second in the 100-yard freestyle (1:03.62) and 100-yard breaststroke (1:22.68).

Ian Bonsall (15-18 boys) won gold in the 50-yard freestyle and was a second place finisher in the 200-yard freestyle (2:20.29) and 100-yard backstroke (1:18.72).

There were six relay winners, one more than last week. The 8 and under mixed 100-yard medley relay (2:02.46) tried it for the first time and came out a winner. The swimmers were Sydney Hahn, Jared Stoffel, Ethan McDaniel and Olivia Bassett.

The 11-12 boys won the 200-yard freestyle relay (2:13.06) with Dusty Johnson, Hagan Hoss, Peyton Sieck and Levi House swimming. The 11-12 boys also won the 200-yard

medley (2:43.53), their best of the season. Those swimming were Johnson, Simon Bassett, Hoss and House.

The 13-14 mixed relay teams were winners in both of their races, the 200-yard freestyle (2:40.89) with Simon Bassett, Ryan Volk, Powell Sieck and Hannah Eslinger swimming and the 200-yard medley (3:05.81) with Powell Sieck, Hannah Eslinger, Peyton Sieck and Ryan Volk swimming.

The 13-14 mixed 200-yard freestyle relay (2:14.23) team won gold with Gerell Miller, Makayla Kennedy, Paetyn Barriclow and Aaron Avelar swimming.

In 8 and under girls Sydney Hahn was fifth in the 25-yard backstroke (29.30).

The 8 and under girl 100-yard freestyle was fourth (2:08.17) with Athena Armstrong, Annika Linin, Sydney Hahn and Olivia Bassett swimming.

In 8 and under boys Ethan McDaniel was second in the 50-yard freestyle (46.63), second in the 25-yard freestyle (20.09) and second in the 25-yard breaststroke (26.81) and Jared Stoffel was third in the 50-yard freestyle (50.65), fourth in the 25-yard backstroke (31.31) and third 25-yard breaststroke (28.80).

The 8 and under boys 100-yard freestyle was fourth (1:58.32) with Jared Stoffel, Walker Eslinger, Devontay Hardy and Ethan McDaniel swimming.

In 9-10 girls Rachel Witman was fourth in the 100-yard freestyle (1:37.47) and fifth in the 25-yard breaststroke (25.72).

The 9-10 girls 100-yard freestyle was sixth (1:35.72) with Rachel Witman, Teryn Teeter, Rebecca Lockhart and Savannah Solomon

swimming.

In 9-10 boys Austin Hahn was second in the 100-yard freestyle (1:24.91), fifth in the 25-yard freestyle (17.29) and fourth in the 25-yard breaststroke (24.68) and Ryan Volk was fourth in the 100-yard freestyle (1:33.46), fifth in the 25-yard butterfly (22.00) and second in the 100-yard individual medley (2:02.84).

The 9-10 mixed 100-yard medley was second (1:38.62) with Rebecca Lockhart, Austin Hahn, Rachel Witman and Teryn Teeter swimming.

In 11-12 girls Sianna Miller was fourth in the 100-yard freestyle (1:22.50) and second in the 50-yard freestyle (34.81); Kinsey Volk was fourth in the 200-yard freestyle (3:09.74); and Elee McDaniel fifth in the 200-yard freestyle (3:14.22).

The 11-12 girls 200-yard relay was third (2:33.12) with Kinsey Volk, Ellee McDaniel, Mikayla Stoffel and Sianna Miller swimming.

The 11-12 girls 200-yard medley was fourth (3:11.49) with Kinsey Volk, Mikayla Stoffel, Sianna Miller and Ellee McDaniel swimming.

In 11-12 boys Hoss was second in the 200-yard freestyle (2:52.34), second in the 50-yard freestyle (32.35) and second in the 50-yard butterfly (39.49); Simon Bassett was third in the 200-yard freestyle (3:06.09), sixth in the 50-yard freestyle (36.33) and second in the 50-yard breaststroke (43.67); House was third in the 100-yard freestyle (1:22.49), third in the 50-yard butterfly (44.13) and second in the 100-yard individual medley (1:36.31); Peyton Sieck was second in the 100-yard freestyle (1:21.37), fourth in the 50-yard freestyle (34.41) and

third in the 100-yard individual medley (1:36.81); and Powell Sieck was fifth in the 50-yard backstroke (47.82) and fourth in the 50-yard butterfly (45.81).

In 13-14 girls Barriclow was fifth in the 100-yard backstroke (45.05) and Kennedy was sixth in the 200-yard individual medley (4:05.72).

In 13-14 boys Aaron Avelar was fourth in the 200-yard freestyle (2:59.27), fourth in the 50-yard freestyle (32.08) and fourth in the 100-yard backstroke (1:39.87).

The 13-14 mixed 200-yard medley was second (2:38.81) with Gerell Miller, Kennedy, Avelar and Barriclow swimming.

In 15-18 girls Brooke Lockhart was fourth in the 20-yard freestyle (2:53.37) and third in the 100-yard backstroke (1:31.78) and Shayley Miller was sixth in the 100-yard breaststroke (1:36.58).

In 15-18 boys Holton Witman was second in the 100-yard breaststroke (1:25.97) and third in the 200-yard individual medley (2:52.12).

The 15-18 mixed 200-yard freestyle relay was third (2:09.23) with Bonsall, Shayley Miller, Brooke Lockhart and Holton Witman swimming.

The 15-18 mixed 200-yard medley was second (2:20.42) with Bonsall, Holton Witman and Brooke Lockhart swimming.

Danielle McElhaney was also a swimmer.

In the meet the Colby Swim Club was first with 301 points, Burlington Swim Club third with 210, Wray Swim Club fourth with 181, Holyoke Swim Club with 180, Oberlin Swim Club sixth with 155, Oakley Swim Team seventh with 40 and Flagler Swim Club eighth with 18.

# Former Cowboy coach receives national honor

Former Goodland Wrestling Coach Eddie Clark was named Coach of the Year by the National High School Coaches Association (NHSCA) in a ceremony held in Grand Rapids, Mich. on June 22.

Clark, who is beginning his 12th season as the head wrestling coach at Star Valley High School in Afton, Wyo., was named the National Coach of the Year by the NHSCA after being nominated out of his region which includes Wyoming, Montana, Idaho, Alaska, Oregon and Washington. It is the second time Clark has been named a regional nominee, also earning this recognition in 2007.

Clark grew up in Spearfish, S.D., winning a state championship in high school at 112 pounds for Rick Jensen. He then went on to Northern State University in Aberdeen, S.D. where he earned All-America honors at 134 pounds.

He began his coaching career in Wall, S.D. where he learned the ropes for three seasons before moving to Goodland. In seven years, his Goodland High School program won a state championship and had four, top-three finishes.

At that point, Clark moved to Afton, Wyo where his Braves have won four state championships and compiled four state runner-up finishes. During his 11 seasons at Star Valley High School, Clark's teams have won 10 regional titles. His teams have lost just one conference dual in the past four years in Wyoming's largest classification.

"There are so many, but I really credit three guys," Clark stated. Jerry Childs, who drug me into the sport of wrestling in junior high. He got me started. Then Forrest Flaagan, high school cross-country coach who taught me how to deal with people and relate to kids. And, my high school coach, Rick Jensen, who is still the best technician I've ever seen. He taught me the love of the sport and talked about giving back."

The award is compiled from success within the program, contributions to the state association, contributions to the sport and longevity.

"It really is humbling," Clark added. "To look back and see who played a part and taught me these lessons."
