Designing, launching rockets big 4-H project

nt.betz@nwkansas.com Designing,building and launching rockets is a big project for the Lockhart sisters who are members of the Prairie Dale 4-H Club.

Brooke, 16, will be a junior at Goodland High School next year and has been in 4-H for 10 years. She currently is Prairie Dale club president, a 4-H junior leader helping with foods and rocketry and a 4-H Ambassador.

Becca, 9, will be going into fourth grade at Central Elementary and has been in 4-H for three years.

Their brother, Kerek, is 5, and will probably join 4-H next year.

The three are the children of Scott and Lisa Lockhart who live in the Paxton Addition on the south edge of Goodland. Scott works at the National Weather Service office in Goodland and is one of the Prairie Dale club leaders and project leader for rocketry.

Brooke said she helps Mrs. Barb

Winston with the foods projects and her dad with rocketry. She said she got intro rocketry her first year in 4-H and her dad took over being the rocketry leader the next year. She said her dad had lots of experience with rocketry from when he was in 4-H.

She has been a junior leader for four years and besides helping with foods and rocketry the junior leaders help organize and put on a fishing clinic, bike rodeo and help with other events during the year such as the livestock shows.

The 4-H Ambassadors help organize the fair parade, select the fair theme, select the grand marshals and help set up for these programs.

Besides rocketry Brooke has been involved in sewing, knitting and embroidery for seven or eight years.

She said she has done well in rocketry, and admits it helps a lot that her dad is the leader. She said she had gotten grand champion several times and got reserve champion last year.

Brooke likes the details involved in designing and building the rockets, and said the finished is rewarding.

She said one of the tests is that it actually flies.

'Yes the rocket is required to fly to go to state, but not for the county fair," she said. "All of the rockets we have built will fly. We hold an annual launch to test them."

Brooke has gone to state several times, and said the criteria at state is a lot tougher.

"You get to see rockets built in different areas, and get ideas about different ways to build a rocket," she said. "Going to state is a good way to get more ideas."

Brooke is not sure about the judges at state as to whether they are more experienced with rocketry than those who judge at the county fair. She said the contestants do not get to interview or talk to the judges at state.

She said for the past few years at the Northwest Kansas District Fair the judge has experience in rocketry, woodworking and small engines. She said she likes him and he has been good to answer questions and give suggestions

As to her best rocket Brooke had to think a minute and said it was probably a rocket she did her third year in 4-H. She said it was a lot more complicated than anything she had tried, and her dad helped her with some of the techniques.

She said one of the hardest things was in finishing it had rivets along the entire thing and they were waterslide decals, not peel and stick, and he helped her with that.

had spray painted the whole rocket on her own. She said it is hard to get the little spray cans to work with little fingers.

"I learned a lot with that one as the body styling was different on that rocket," she said.

She said that rocket flew pretty good. She said it broke during the launch last year, but has been fixed. She showed two examples of rockets she had built in the past -

was the one from the year before. She said both were from a series on the space race between several companies with the idea to build the best tourist rocket for the future. She said the rockets are replicas of what the companies have designed.

> Brooke is working as a lifeguard at Steever Water Park, and works as a babysitter at the First Baptist Church during the school year on Wednesdays for the Bible Study.

Brooks doesn't drive yet, but her a swim meet in Colby, and would mom is looking forward to that day when she can reduce the number of trips she has to make.

She said she gets to organize and run meetings as a club president. She agreed being the junior leader, ambassador and club president help with her ability to do public speaking.

Brooke does arts and crafts especially drawings with pencil and pen and ink. She likes to draw different subjects, especially characters from animated movies.

It interests her to see how the animation works, and how different fields are created for each of the different characters with their personalities and how they are animated and how they move and the different facial expressions.

She has written her first book, and likes to make up stories. She wrote the book when she was in first grade. She said she was reading about dinosaurs and one reminded her of long necks, and so she made up a story about a long neck and came up with the book, and it is illustrated.

She said she is going to make her second book eight pages long with illustrations, and she will do the illustrations.


