

# Outlaws fall to Norton in championship rematch

Players, coaches and fans of the Goodland American Legion Outlaws baseball team put more than 1,320 miles on their cars last week making five trips to Norton, but came up short in the final championship games losing to Norton 12-5 on Saturday.

Legion Coach John Dautel said the boys played excellent baseball for the next four games after losing to Colby 8-5 in the second round on Tuesday.

"It was fun to be around the boys," he said, "and they had a real feeling for wanting to win."

He said the Outlaws went 5-2 in the zone tournament. Their record was 5-7 going in, but the team had four games that did not count, and adding them gives the team a 14-9 record for the season.

The zone tournament was a double elimination tournament and Dautel said Goodland played every team in the zone, and faced two of the teams twice.

On Wednesday the Outlaws made their third trip to Norton and defeated Osborne 18-6.

Teather Dautel hit a home run in the win, and was the starting pitcher. Coach John Dautel said he brought Robert Cowan in to finish up.

Thursday found the Outlaws back on the road to Norton to face Smith Center who had lost to Norton 14-11 on Wednesday. The Outlaws defeated Smith Center 20-8.

Ryan Hillmer had a home run against Smith Center, coach Dautel

said. Gunner Helton was the starting pitcher and Hillmer came in to finish.

Friday the Outlaws were back in

Norton to face Colby for the second time, and defeated them 4-2 to advance to the championship round.

Reed Bellamy had a home run

against Colby, coach Dautel said. Michael Pettibone threw a great game against Colby, he said, and Hillmer came in to finish up.

Facing Norton in the championship game on Friday the Outlaws had the better team winning 9-0.

Garth Helton threw a complete

game against Norton, Dautel said.

This was Norton's first loss, and with Norton and Goodland tied with one loss each the Outlaws had to return to Norton on Saturday for the final game. The Outlaws lost the final 12-5, but coach Dautel said he was proud of how the boys played.

He said they had a ball in the sixth inning on Saturday that came up short or the Outlaws would have been ahead of Norton.

In the final game Gunner Helton was the starting pitcher, Bellamy came in for relief and Garth Helton came in to finish up.

Coach Dautel said the second loss to Norton was disappointing, but he said it had been fun to be around the boys and felt it was the funnest group of kids I have been around who wanted to win a right time.

He said the umpires told the boys they were impressed by their sportsmanship and how they came ready to play.

"We don't often hear that," Dautel said, "and I was proud of how the boys played and showed great sportsmanship even after the loss to Norton."

mud and other obstacles.

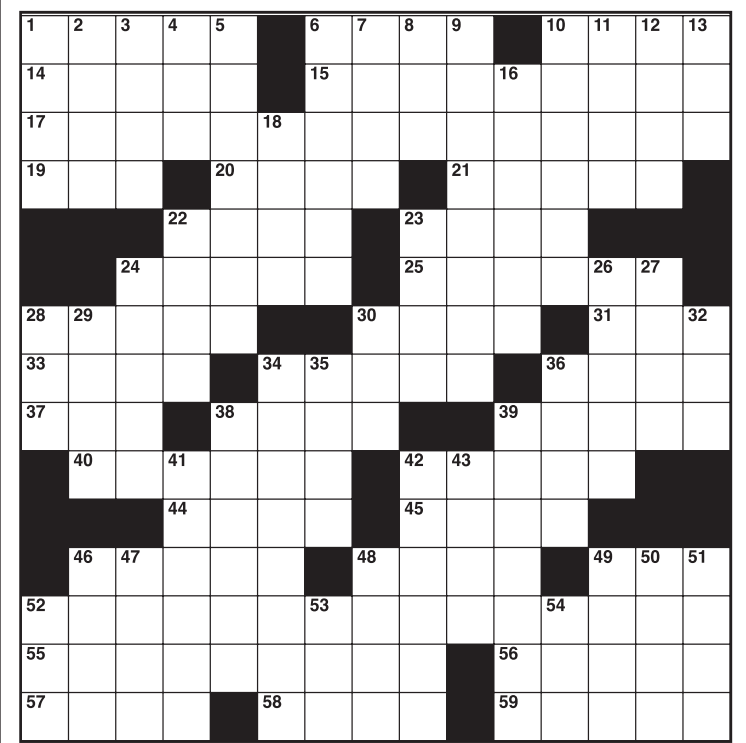
