

Elks K-18 lose to Phillipsburg

The Elks K-18 season came to an end Saturday at the regional tournament in Oakley with Goodland losing to Phillipsburg 7-0 in the first round.

Coach Dr. Gary Smith said it was a disappointing way to finish the season, and felt the boys had a good season finishing with a 13-3 league record and a 13-6 total for the summer.

He said the team is very young, and felt they got down when they

fell behind 3-0 in the first inning.

Kaylor Amthor was the starting pitcher, and Taylen Smith came into pitch in the third with Goodland down 4-0.

Smith said the Goodland players had trouble getting their bats going and there were a total of five hits in the game, but he said really there were only three hits as one was on a fielders choice and the other was on an error.

For the season Smith said the boys

played well and improved a lot from where they started. He said some of the things that hurt on Saturday were little errors that let Phillipsburg get base runners and score runs.

"We played well in league games, and no one could beat our top team," he said.

In the league play teams played two games with the first being a full seven inning game and the second a five inning game where each team had to play everyone.

Smith said if the second game had not counted they would have been the top seed in the regional and feels Goodland had a good chance to make it to state.

Smith said he had a great group of young boys, and hopes they will continue to play in the future. He feels the team will continue to improve.

Assisting in the coaching were Dave Avila and Asa Stiles. Smith said Roxanne Kling was the manager and a great help.

Make-up feature races from the July 9 rainout were run first on Saturday for IMCA Modifieds, IMCA Northern Sport Modifieds, IMCS Stock Cars and Econos.

The annual Bill Grey Memorial and Kids Night will be the next scheduled racing event on Saturday, Aug. 20. Two more race dates remain with Saturday, Sept. 3, the last racing before the 22nd Annual Flatlander Fall Classic held over to nights, Friday and Saturday, Sept. 23 and 24.

In the IMCA Modifieds Brady Coen (3) held off Darren DeLoach (21) in the last laps to win the delayed feature race. Coen and DeLoach started out down in the pack, but Coen moved to take the lead about half way through the race. DeLoach started out further down, and managed to work his way up to second with a few laps left.

A yellow flag brought the racers close together for the final laps, and at one point it appeared DeLoach was going to pull out a victory, but Coen managed to stay ahead for the win.

Coen was close to DeLoach in the track points race, and might have moved into the top spot.

Keith Stegman (19) finished third, Adam Morris (8) fourth and Shannon Maughlin (17M) fifth.

In the IMCA Sport Modifieds feature Chris Heim (1) kept his winning streak, and he is leading the track point standing. Jacob Adler (18A) was second, and follows Heim closely in the track standings.

Third annual triathlon planned

The Third Annual Goodland Triathlon will be held at 7 a.m. on Saturday, Aug. 13, in conjunction with the Sherman County all school reunion, and a 5K run/walk is being included for those who may not want to do the triathlon but want to participate in this annual fun event.

The Goodland Activities Center is sponsoring the event and it will start and finish at Steever Water Park. Registration deadline is Monday, Aug. 8. For more information and registration details go to <http://goodlandgac.com/bulletin/?112#112> or contact the GAC at (785) 890-7242.

The triathlon will be a "sprint" triathlon which consist of a one-half mile swim, 12.4 mile (20km) bike ride, and a 3.1 mile (5 km) run. This event will have competitive and non-competitive classes and can be done as an individual or as a team.

In the team environment each team member will be responsible to complete at least one event. Triathletes will start with the swim, swimming 17 laps in the pool, then change into their biking gear and start biking from Steever Water Park; head north on Arcade to Eighth Street, turn west on Eighth and bike towards Sugar Hills Golf Course, turn around as they pass the golf course and climb the hills and head back to town on Eighth turning south on Main Ave., and racing to the final stretch by turning east on 16th to Steever Park.

After completing the 20km bike ride they change into their running gear and begin the 5km run; running north on Arcade

from Steever Park until they get to Second Street where they will head west to Main, run down Main until 16th where they will be on the final stretch to Steever Park for the finish. The full length of the event will be 16 miles.

The 5k run/walk will start at Steever Park and finish at Steever Park. The run/walk will follow the same route as the triathlon 5km run. We will have several water stations on the course where shade, drinks and fruit will be available for the competitors.

This event brings many local and nonlocal competitors into Goodland. We are hoping this year will do the same since we have scheduled it in conjunction with the Sherman County All School Reunion. This is a fun event and allows people to try something new and help encourage fitness, said Grady Bonsall who is helping set up the event.

Triathlons have become very popular throughout the United States and why not have one in Northwest Kansas where the weather is great, the land is flat, and the people are friendly, he said. This event demonstrates what the Goodland community is all about with the help of all the volunteers, the use of city facilities, the help from the HAM radio club and sponsorship from the GAC. We thank everyone who is willing to help and make this event a success, he said.

Even if you don't plan to participate we encourage the residents to come out and encourage all the athletes and join the fun.

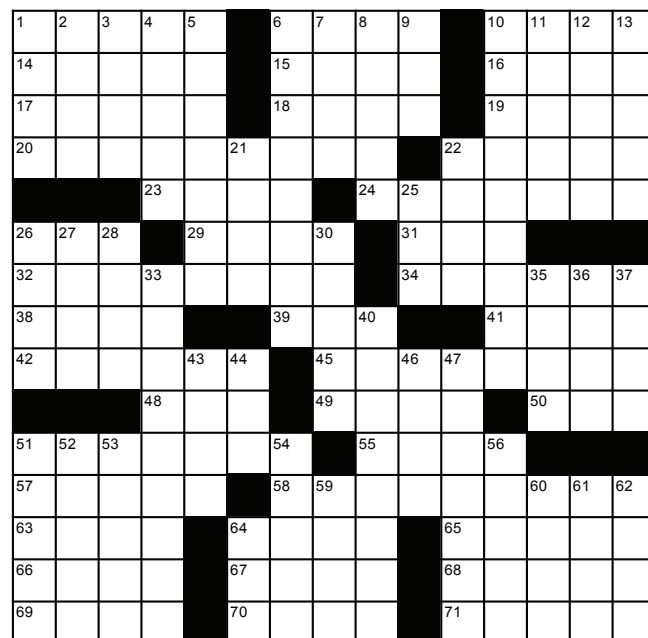

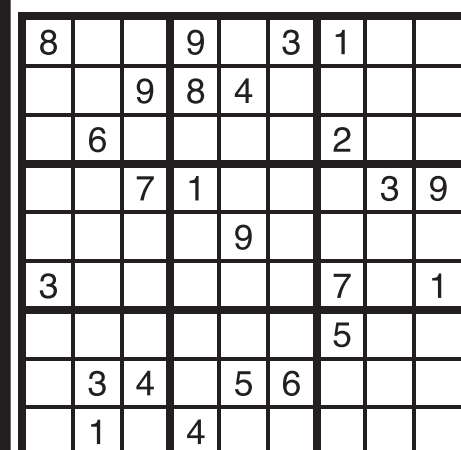
