
# Convenience store expansion

## City plans cleanup week for town in October

nt.betz@nwkansas.com City officials asked Sherman County commissioners Wednesday to waive fees at the transfer station for the Goodland citywide cleanup planned for the week of Oct. 3 to 7, and the commissioners agreed.

City Manager Doug Gerber and Public Works Director Rich Simon were at the county meeting to discuss the cleanup week plans.

Simon asked the county to waive the fees, and said the city would be doing tires again, but would only handle individuals and not busi-

He said the main target will be cleaning alleys and knows the city
