Fewer adults are smoking cigarettes

Fewer American adults are smoking cigarettes according to a new "Vital Signs" report from the Center for Disease Control and Prevention. Also, daily smokers are smoking fewer cigarettes each day, it says.

The report, which covers data from 2005 to 2010, shows an estimated 19.3 percent or 45.3 million of American adults, aged 18 and 18, continue to smoke, a decline from smoker or a long-time smoker to get 20.9 percent in 2005. Of those adults a smoking-related disease or have a health burden and economic impact who smoke, 78.2 percent (35.4 million) smoke every day.
