

Mavericks lose to Trojans in first rivalry dual

The Northwest Tech Mavericks met the Colby Community College Trojans for a dual at Keirns Fitness Center Friday evening with the Trojans coming out winners 38-9.

Coach Steve Lampe said it was a historic first to have the two local college teams meet in a dual at Northwest Tech. Another dual is planned for January in Colby, he said.

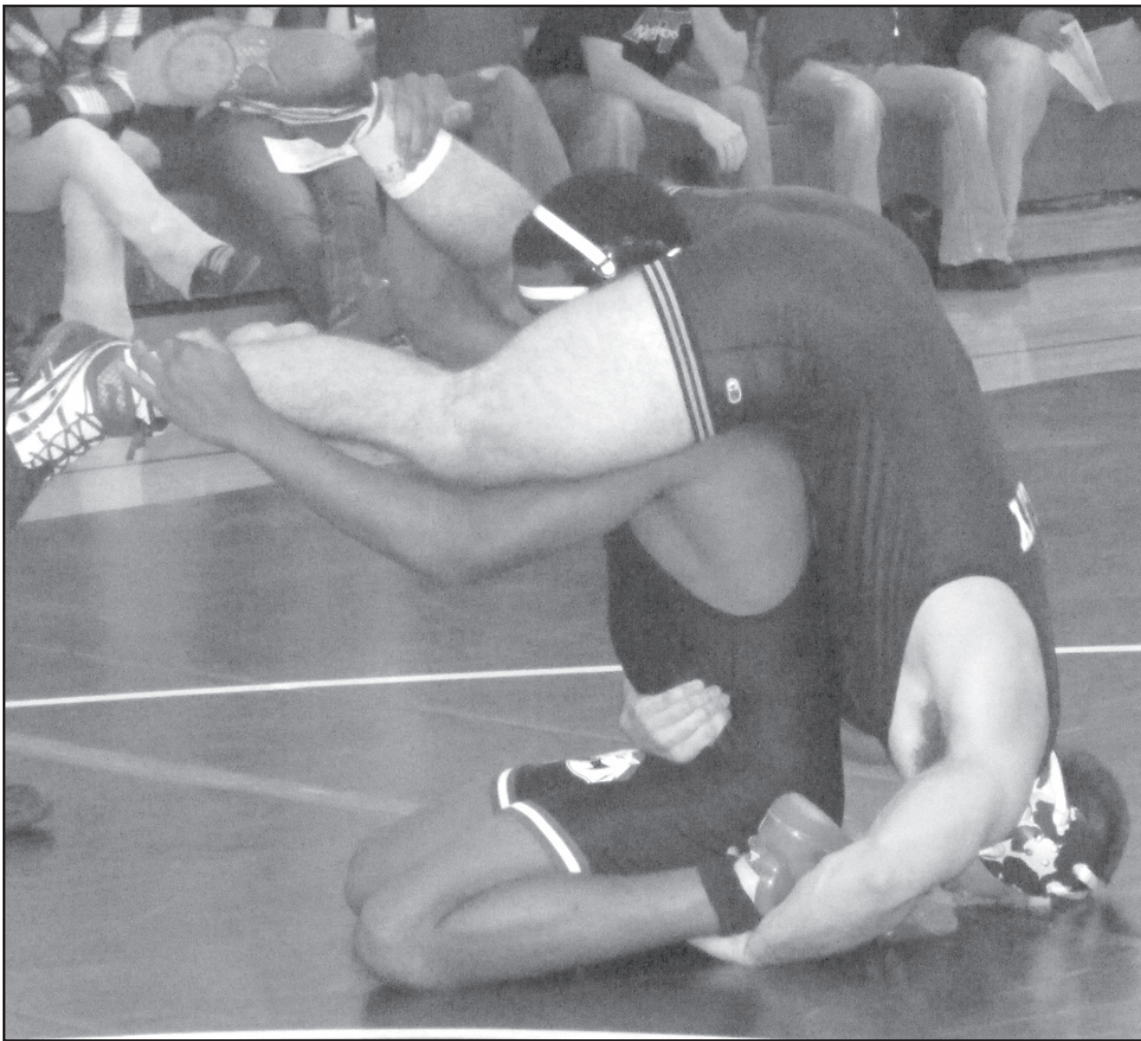
Lampe said he knew the Trojans had a good team, and was glad his team was able to get a couple of wins in the dual with one pin and a 6-5 decision.

He said he felt some of his wrestlers were up against nationally ranked opponents and got quite a wrestling lesson.

About 120 people attended the dual, and got a thrill about half way through when by accident the lights went out. Athletic Director Bill Finley said the switch for the light is very sensitive and when the switch was accidentally hit it knocked them out. It took more than five minutes for the lights to reset to allow the wrestling action to continue.

The Mavericks travel to Greeley, Colo., on Saturday for the University of Northern Colorado Old Chicago tournament.

Friday against Colby at 125 pounds Maverick Miguel Guzman of Massachusetts, lost an 11-6 decision to Trojan Marco Tamayo of Dallas, who was ranked sixth in the National Junior College Athletic Association.

The coach is Troy Elmore, who said the four women were recruited first to help the women's soccer team, but the secondary idea was to start a women's wrestling program.

He said the four attended their first meet on Saturday, Nov. 5, at Marshal, Mo., for the Missouri Valley Open.

13-1 in Jayhawk Western Conference play winning the conference title for the second year straight.

After defeating Seward last Saturday in relative easy fashion, Barton was forced to a second championship match following the Lady Saints' come-from-behind five-set win in the first championship match. In the winner-take-all second championship

match, the Lady Cougars were pushed to four sets but captured their second straight Region VI title and earned their second straight trip to the NJCAA Division I Volleyball National Tournament.

Barton seeded No. 14 will play their first game of the national tournament in West Plains, Mo., at 8 a.m. Mountain Standard Time on Thursday, against No. 3 seeded Western Wyoming Community College, in West Plains, Mo.

Should the Lady Cougars win

their first match they would play at 4:30 p.m. Mountain Standard Time on Thursday against the winner of No. 6 Iowa Western versus No. 11 Temple College match. If Barton loses their first match, they would play at 9:00 a.m. on Friday against the loser of Iowa Western-Temple match.

Barton won the National Championship in 2003, and this will be the team's 21st appearance in the national tournament.
