National Weather Forecaster Jerry Killingsworth rode his bike to work on Friday when it was not snowing, but Saturday morning he had to bundle up with extra gloves as he rode his bike home in about three inches of snow. The storm came in late Friday and dropped a total of 6.5 inches of snow with .34 of moisture before it was done about 5 p.m. on Saturday. Accidents along I-70 at Brewster and west of Goodland caused I-70 to be closed for several hours on Saturday. Sunday morning the Sherman County Sheriff and Kansas State Troopers were helping people who had slid off in the snow. Several minor accidents were reported and wrecker services were busy Sunday pulling cars out of snow drifts.
