mary of Vital Statistics is now available. This report contains information on births, deaths, marriages, divorces, abortions and stillbirths. It is a valuable took for public health program evaluation and community health assessment. The Annual Summary has been published in October or November for the past 10 years by the Kansas Department of Health and Environment.

The most notable change for 2010 was the decrease in the number of infant deaths.

"Though 253 deaths among infants remains unacceptable, it is encouraging that 2010 marks the third consecutive year of lower infant deaths in Kansas," said Robert Moser, state health officer. Fewer infant deaths were reported in 2010 than in any year since vital records were first collected in 1911; though, the infant death rate in the state. at 6.3 per 1,000 live births, is just now approaching the average rate in the U.S. Kansas continues to
