Cyclones win titles, set records

nt.betz@nwkansas.com The 23rd Annual Topside Tip-Off championships on Saturday saw the Ottawa Cyclones sweep with the boys winning their fifth straight title and the Lady Cyclones winning their fourth straight championship

The Cyclones defeated McCook in the championship game for the fourth straight time winning 72-49 on Saturday at Max Jones Fieldhouse. The Lady Cyclones defeated the Burlington Lady Cougars 48-37 in the championship for the second year.

On their way to the boys championship the Cyclones had a player set two Topside tournament records. Cyclone junior Semi Ojeleye, 6'7", set the record for the most points by a player in a game hitting 45 in the championship game against McCook, and the most points by a player in the three games with 109 points.

Ojeleye beat the individual game record of 40 points held by three players Adam Braxmeyer of Atwood in 1992, Todd Okeson of $We skan in 1998 \, and \, Tate \, Andrews \, of \, Wallace$ County in 2009. Ojeleye beat the 90 points scored by Josh Reid of Brewster in 1995.

In the championship game Ojeleye broke the tournament scoring record in the second quarter. Coming into the championship Ojeleye needed 26 points to tie the tournament record of 90 points. He got 10 points in the first quarter and 19 in the second quarter. To break the individual game record Ojeleye had 11 points in the third quarter and five points in the fourth quarter. For his 45 points Ojeleye had two three-point baskets 12 field goals and was 15 of 15 free throws.

Ottawa followed the scoring of Ojeleye to defeat the McCook Bison 72-49 for their fifth straight tournament title and eighth of the past 10 years. Ottawa defeated McCook in the championship game last year.

When the game started the Cyclones were feeding the ball to Ojeleye who scored 10 of the 12 points in the first quarter including six free throws and two field goals. Ottawa led 12-9 after the first with Bison Cody Wudtke scoring six of the nine and Bison Matt Chitwood putting in a three-point basket to keep it close.

Ottawa took control in the second quarter outscoring McCook 25-11 to lead 37-20 at halftime. McCook had two three-point baskets from Kyle Gaston and a three-point basket from Sean Backer and a field goal by Wudtke. Ojeleye had six free throws four field goals and two three-point baskets in the Hasty Dallas Natt and James Peoples

State Rep. Rick Billinger has an idea: pay moving expenses for people to move from eastern Kansas to western Kansas to fill the available jobs.

Colby City Manager Carolyn Armstrong said the city has been asking all public officials to help pursue an exemption for power plants like the one in Colby that operate less than 100 hours a year.


