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Commission backs fire contract

kbottrell@nwkansas.com The Goodland City Commission decided by consensus on Monday to pursue a contract with Sherman County to provide fire protection service, but opinions remain divided over

City Manager Doug Gerber said he felt the issue had come to a point where the commission needed to come to a consensus and then vote. Mayor John Garcia said one of the things the commission had to decide is whether to go with full consolidation, which would cre-

it, or a contract for services, under which the he said. county would pay the city to run fire protection for both.

City Attorney Jerry Fairbanks was at the meeting to talk about two state statutes under which the city and county can consolidate fire protection. Fairbanks said there are essential two statutes under which the county and city could consolidate fire services, and each has different requirements, but the city and county can write in various provisions into the agreement, such as taxation and representation.

"You can do pretty much what you want ate a new fire district and a fire board to run as long as you and the county agree on it,"

Commissioner Chris Zimmerman, who has supported consolidation, said he's been talking to current Rural Fire Board members, who say they don't think a fire district would have to exceed five mills, especially since city and county would be pooling equipment.

Fairbanks said under one statute, the agreement is required to contain some sort of exit strategy. Zimmerman suggested a three-year review period, after which the city and county would decide whether to keep things consolidated or go back to the current structure.

Commissioner Bill Finley said for him

the issue keeps coming back to the cost. He asked Gerber if there was a way to research how much a consolidation would cost or save. Gerber said there's no way to definitively predict costs or savings. Fire Chief Brian James said there are no similar consolidations that could be looked at for comparison. Thomas County contracts with the city of Colby for fire service, Burlington and Kit Carson County have always had just one fire department and Greeley County consolidated all city and county government.

The 170th is based at the armory in Norton and includes the armory in Colby. The Goodland armory was a part of the unit before it was closed down in March, 2010. The unit includes people from all over northwest Kansas, including two current Goodland residents. Weber was born and raised here. He moved in 2006 after becoming a full-time National Guardsman.

The 170th is about half veteran soldiers who have been deployed before, Weber said, and half younger soldiers. Some unit members were around when the unit was last deployed 20 years ago in Operation Desert Storm. Both groups are highly motivated, he said.

"The troops are extremely motivated,"he said. "That makes it easier from a command perspective."

Weber said 170th had been set for deployment several years ago, but did not end up going overseas. When it was deployed in February, 1991, the unit acted in support and maintenance roles for Army units during the fighting in Kuwait and helped with repair, cleanup and inspection after.

This will be Weber's first deployment, something he describes as an exciting prospect.
