Junior varsity track team gets third place at home

Both the Goodland boys and girls track teams placed third at the home junior varsity tournament on Monday at Goodland High School.

Girls

Carlee Cooper placed first in the 800 meters with 2:52.23.

Sierra Estes placed first in the 3,200 meters with 15:41.35 and fifth in the 1,600 meters with 7:22.71.

Jordan Knitig won first place in the pole vault with a vault of 7 feet, 6 inches.

Despite racking up an impressive number of first place finishes, the Goodland High School varsity boys track team was edged out for the top spot at the Atwood meet on Tuesday.

On the girls side, Goodland High came in fifth behind Oberlin, Atwood, Dundy County and Hitchcock County.

The teams' next meet will be Tuesday in Scott City.

The Cowboys came in second, four team points behind Dundy County from Nebraska. Oberlin came in third with 113.

Reed Bellamy picked up another pair of first place finishes in the 110-meter hurdles with a time of 16.50 and in the 300-meter hurdles with 41.49

Matching Bellamy this time was Todd Snethen, who got first place finishes in the 100 meters with 11.78 and in the 200 meters with 24.12; and Dax Ruhs, who won the high jump with 5 feet, 4 inches and the javelin with 149 feet, 11 inches. Ruhs also placed second in the 100 meters.

Holton Witman placed first in the pole vault with 11 feet, 6 inches.

The 4-by-400 meter relay team of Bellamy, Colton Cooper, Oharah and Snethen placed first with 3:40.9.

Goodland golfers took the top two spots. Gage Ihrig placed first, shooting a 75. One stroke above

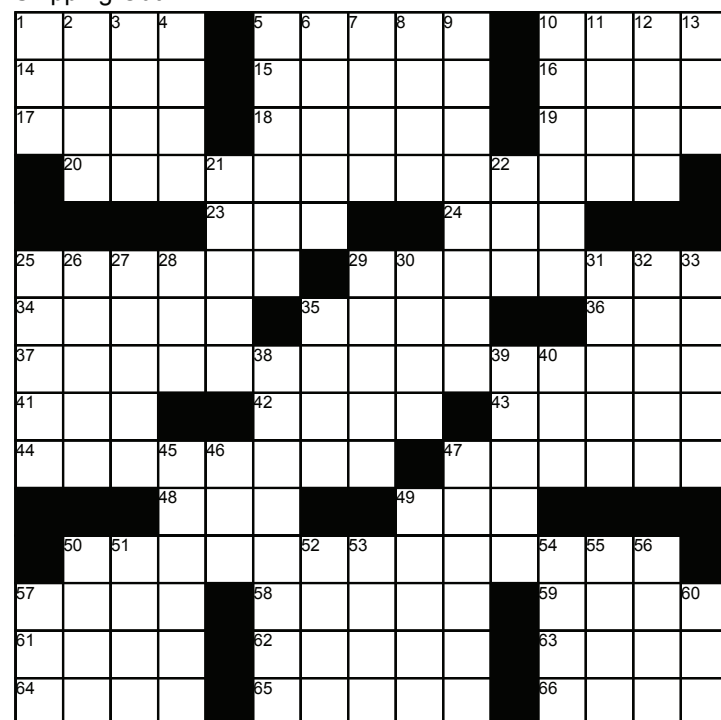
him was Joel Linin, who took second. Gannon Ihrig got sixth with a 79.

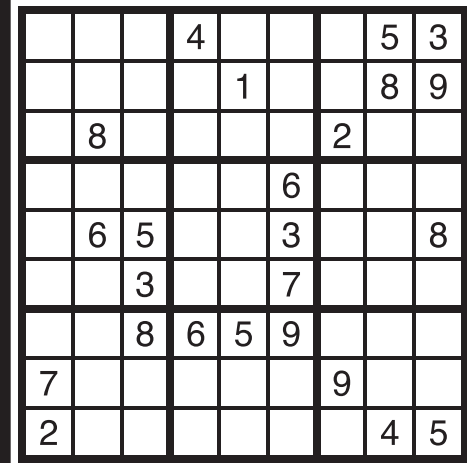
