Pinch back mums for more blooms

Colorful garden mums are a by about half, your plant with be perennial fall favorite. For a big, bushy display, however, gardeners must remember months earlier to do some maintenance.

"Unless you've pinched or cut the plants back two or three times before July 4, the stems will be tall, leggy and few in number when they bloom," said Deniis Patton, Kansas State University horticulturist. "So, if you haven't started yet or you're just now transplanting mums into your garden, you need to pinch them back as soon as possible."

The idea with mums is to cut back the new growth by half, preferably starting when the plant has four to six leaves below each stem's top growth, Patton said. That will force the leaf axils below ever top cut to send out side shoots. The plant will be shorter, but end up with about six new stems everywhere it used to have one. You repeat the process each

time the new stems have about put up about four inches of growth," he said. "If you only cut them back

about two inches taller after every trimming. 'You quit around the Fourth of

July, so the shoots will have time

to put on new growth and set buds. They'll be ready to bloom next Gardeners with a few mums may

pinch them by hand or cut off the tops with scissors about one-quarter of an inch above a leaf. "That's a little time-consuming

and tedious, though," Patton said. "If your're a weekend warrior-type gardener, you'll find it's a lot easier and faster to get out there with your hedge shears and chop them back. So long as you more or les keep the one-half rule in mind, that also will allow new shoots to break out and

"If your plant's healthy, each shoot should produce a fistful of flowers. So, by multiplying each stem several times, you'll have that gorgeous bushy effect for the end of the season."
