WHEREAS, the governing body did by Resolution No. 1366, dated the 21st day of May, 2012, fix the time and place of a hearing at which the owner, his or her agent, and lienholders, any occupants and all other parties of interest of such structure could appear and show cause why such structure should not be condemned and ordered repaired or demolished, and provided for giving notice thereof as provided by law; and,

# If the owner fails to commence the repair of the struc-

ture within the time stated, or any additional time granted by the governing body, or fails to diligently prosecute the same until the work is completed, the governing body will cause the structure to be razed and removed and the costs of razing and removing, less salvage, if any, shall be collected in the manner provided by K.S.A. 12-1,1115, and amendments thereto or shall be assessed as special assessments against the lot or parcel of land upon which the structure is located or both, all as provided by law.

# BEITFURTHERRESOLVED,

that if the owner fails to commence the repair of the structure within the time provided herein or fails to diligently prosecute the same, the governing body may take such further action as it deems necessary to raise and remove the structure without further notice to the owner or other parties in interest.

WHEREAS, Resolution No. 1366 was published in the official city paper on the 25th day of May, 2012, and on the 1st day of June, 2012, and a copy of said resolution was served upon all persons entitled thereto as provided by law; and,

WHEREAS, on the 2nd day of July, 2012, the governing body did conduct the hearing scheduled in Resolution No. 1366 and took evidence from the following: the Enforcing Officer on behalf of the City and the Owner.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERN-ING BODY OF THE CITY OF GOODLAND, KANSAS, THAT:

1. The governing body hereby finds that the structure located at Lots Eighteen (18), Nineteen (19), Twenty (20) and Twentyone (21), Block Thirty-three (33), First Addition to the City of Goodland, Kansas according to the recorded plat thereof. Also known as 816 W 14th, is unsafe and dangerous and directs that such structure is to be repaired and the premises made safe and secure.

The owner of such structure is hereby directed to commence the repair of the property within ninety (90) days of July 2, 2012. Provided that upon due application by the owner and for good cause shown, the governing body, in its sole discretion, may grant the owner additional time to complete the repairs to the
