The Goodland Slammers 12 and under softball team played in the Father's Day Tournament in Russell in mid-June.

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




Freedom Fest draws crowd

Goodland placed under water watch

kbottrell@nwkansas.com Responding to increased water usage during the current heat wave, the Goodland City Commission approved a "water watch" at its regular meeting Monday.

City Manager Doug Gerber said the city has pumped about 222 million gallons of water so far this year as of last week, about 52 million more than this time last year. The for today, but down to 93 Saturday, city is allowed to pump about 700 million gallons a year.

Gerber described a water watch as a "benign" way to encourage conservation. The city will not be monitoring individual usage or issuing tickets, but it encourages people to try and use less water. The city, he said, has already taken steps to reduce its water consumption, such as halting watering of the parks.

The water watch took effect immediately, and will last until the city commission issues a resolution ending it or making it even more stringent. Gerber said according to the ordinance there are three levels the city can put in place: water watch, water warning and water emergency. Water warnings and emergencies carry mandatory usage reduction requirements and stiffer

During the week of June 19-25. more than 500 temperature records were broken nationwide. Goodland set new record temperatures every day from June 22 to 26. After a cooler Saturday, temperatures again broke 100 every day this week.

However, the heat wave may show signs of breaking. The National Weather Service is predicting a high temperature of 101 degrees 85 Sunday and 80 Monday. The service is also predicting as much as a 50 percent chance of thunderstorms Sunday and Monday.

Any moisture would be welcome in parched Sherman County, which is now listed as under an "extreme drought" by the University of Nebraska's Drought Monitor. The Drought Monitor uses several measurements, including the Palmer Drought Index, which is based on soil moisture and using precipitation and temperature. The Drought Monitor also looks at other soil moisture models, weekly streamflow, precipitation index and other drought indicators.

Extreme drought is the secondworst rating on the Drought Monitor scale. Effects of this level can include crop and pasture losses and widespread water shortages.
