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# Area sees temporary heat relief

### High temperatures, drought likely to continue for the area

kbottrell@nwkansas.com The massive heat wave that has scorched northwest Kansas for months showed signs of breaking over the weekend, but this week's forecast still shows higher than normal tem-

After a week of high temperatures – up to 102 on Wednesday – Saturday turned out to At 4:20 p.m., the high temperature reached than usual.

82 degrees – seven degrees under the average for Aug. 4. The record high for Aug. 4 is 104 degrees, set in 1934. The temperature got down to 56 late Saturday night.

Temperatures were warmer Sunday with a high of 91. The National Weather Service was predicting a high of 100 for Monday, and 93-95 for the rest of the week. While these are closer to the normal high of 89 for this be one of the coolest days in recent months. time of year, the temperatures are still hotter

tonight, little moisture is predicted.

Despite a few days of cooler temperatures, Sherman County is still under extreme to exceptional drought, the two highest ratings of the University of Nebraska's National Drought Monitor The Weather Service has recorded .18

inches of rain so far in August and just 3.02 inches since June 1 – 4.13 inches below average. The county is as much as 6.19 inches below average for the year.

A small storm dropped .16 inches on Wednesday, while a larger one dropped .62 inches last Monday.

The City of Goodland has been under a Water Watch, which asks citizens to voluntarily

Other than a slight chance of thunderstorms try to reduce their water usage, since July 9 City Manager Doug Gerber said Monday that while the water situation isn't good, there are currently no plans to go to mandatory water restrictions. The city is continuing to monitor the situation, he said.

Groundwater levels may have also taken a hit from lack of rain. Wayne Bossert, Groundwater District 4 manager, said the situation looks pretty brutal. The Kansas Geological Survey tests more than 1,200 wells across the state each december to measure what the rise or decline in water level compared to previous years, he said, so the overall picture will remain unknown until then.
