

The Sherman County Sheriff's Office and local emergency management personnel helped provide water and food for the firefighters. The Thomas County Sheriff's Department also had a deputy on scene to help look for hotspots. Ambulances from Goodland and Sharon Springs were on standby.

The firefighters fighting the blaze were hampered by the terrain, which had deep gullies in many places,

and the weather. The cold front that moved through only dropped trace amounts of rain, but it brought with it sustained winds up to 23 mph and gusts up to 30 mph. Because of the wind and the dry conditions, the National Weather Service had issued a notice earlier in the day warning of severe fire danger.
