Fire may have been largest in local history

He said he hoped the Livestock Disaster Assistance Bill would pass in the Senate when it went back in session. Roberts said the bill did not pass in the Senate before adjournment because speciality crops such as organic vegetables were not included. It had passed in the House of Representatives. Roberts said producers were having a rough time with the fires, winds and everything is dry as a bone.
