Ruth Eleanor Moore

Ruth Eleanor Moore, 91, retired St. Francis teacher, died Thursday, Aug. 16, 2012, at the Cheyenne County Hospital in St. Francis.

She was born Nov. 14, 1920, to George William Best and Pearl Maida Pasley in a sod house in the South Fork community of Cheyenne County.

She attended rural grade schools, high school in St. Francis. After graduation, she obtained a teaching certificate, taught in rural grade schools and then later the sixth grade in St. Francis. One of her students was astronaut Ron Evans.

On Dec. 27, 1945, she and Wallace Olen Moore were married in St. Francis. In 1948 they moved to a rental farm; 11 years later, they moved into a remodeled one room school house relocated next to her parents' house seven miles north and two east of Wheeler with no indoor plumbing and a party-line phone. The couple retired from farming in 1985, moving into St. Francis.

A passion of hers was the Rebekah Lodge, I.O.O.F., #675. She progressed through the chairs, finally serving as treasurer and president of the Rebekah Assembly, Grand

Matriarch of the Grand L.E.A. and Lady President of the Department Association. She was a charter member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 1528. She was active in 4-H and many other community organizations. Crocheting was a favorite pastime and she taught many people how to crochet.

Preceding her in death was her husband of nearly 50 years on May 18, 1995; and her grandson, Dana Hewett, III on May 12, 2009.

Survivors are a daughter, Karen (Dana) Hewett of Topeka, two granddaughters, Nicole Goodrow of Topeka and Shaundell (Brian) VanPelt of Hays; a granddaughter-in-law, Kristi Hewett of Olathe; six great-grandchildren; and a step-great-granddaughter.

Services were held at 9:30 a.m. (Mountain Time) on Monday, Aug. 20, at the Christian Church, 118 E. Webster, St. Francis with Jeff Landers officiating and burial in the St. Francis Cemetery with the Rebekah graveside ceremony.

Rep. Billinger attends leadership training class

Lombard, Ill. - Rick Billinger of Goodland was among 37 lawmakers to complete a leadership training program that identifies and assists emerging state and provincial leaders in the Midwest.

Billinger met with fellow lawmakers from Kansas, 10 other Midwestern states and four Canadian provinces on Aug. 10-14, in Madison, Wis., for The Council of State Governments' 18th annual Bowhay Institute for Legislative Leadership Development.

"The Bowhay Institute is one of the premier leadership training programs in the nation," says Illinois Rep. Elaine Nekritz, who serves as co-chair of the institute's steering committee. "The legislatures in the region have benefited greatly from the skills their members have gained through this unique educational experience. Many of the graduates now hold leadership positions in their states."

Legislators from Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Nebraska, North Dakota, Ohio, South Dakota, Wisconsin and the Canadian provinces of Alberta, Manitoba, Ontario and Saskatchewan were chosen to participate through a competitive, nonpartisan selection process.

The institute was founded in 1995 to help new legislators meet the demands of federal devolution and, in many states, term limits. These two

emerging forces have highlighted the shortage of training available for legislators, a void that the institute aims to fill.

A program of The Council of State Governments' Midwestern Office, the institute is held in partnership with the University of Wisconsin's Robert M. La Follette School of Public Affairs. Courses and seminars are conducted by La Follette faculty, Midwestern legislative leaders and professional development experts. In addition to courses designed to develop leadership skills, the program analyzes a variety of public policy issues, including corrections and the regional economy.

The program is funded through grants from foundation and corporate sponsors and an in-kind contribution provided by The Council of State Governments' Midwestern Office.

The Bowhay Institute for Legislative Leadership Development is named in honor of the late James Bowhay, longtime director of The Council of State Governments' Midwestern Office. Founded in 1933, The Council of State Governments has national headquarters in Lexington, Ky., and regional offices in Atlanta, Chicago, New York City and Sacramento, Calif. The goal of the national, nonpartisan organization is to assist and advance state government.

K-State offers online youth animal care training

The Beef Cattle Institute at Kansas State University has launched Youth Animal Care Training, an online program at www.animalcaretraining.org/Youth/.

The program targets high school age and younger youth who can complete web-based training modules. The modules focus on animal husbandry and welfare, food safety and environmental stewardship. Thanks to support from BCI sponsors, the Youth Animal Care Training modules are free of charge.

The BCI previously launched the Animal Care Training web-

site www.animalcaretraining.org, which is designed to be informative and interactive for adults who handle livestock.

Modeled after previously successful programs such as Beef Quality Assurance (BQA), Humane Equine Management and Dairy Animal Care and Quality Assurance (DACQA), for which over 10,000 people have registered and 8,200 have earned certification, the Youth Animal Care Training program is designed to educate youth involved in the animal agriculture industry about proper animal welfare proto-

col. The program can also serve to empower children and teens to be a role model for their peers.

The BCI has issued more than 170 youth certifications since the youth program's launch in February 2012. It was designed to demonstrate the importance of exposing children to best management practices.

The Beef Cattle Institute was founded in 2007 to provide beef industry employees and stakeholders with the most current education, research and outreach available in the beef industry. The BCI offers certificates and tools to aid produc-

ers in managing a successful beef business.
