How to check your seed saved-wheat germination

How well will your saved-seed wheat germinate this fall? This question is especially important this year with less than optimal wheat planting conditions. Since we are close to drilling season, an 'athome' germination test can answer this question. It doesn't take long to set up and can be completed in just a week. This way you have an idea of the germination rate and can adjust seeding rates accordingly.

First, place two moistened paper towels (on top of each other) on a flat surface. The towels should not have free water in them. Next, arrange fifty seeds on the towels leaving approximately an inch border around the edges. Place two more moistened towels over the seeds. Make a half to three-quarters inch fold at the bottom of the four paper towels. This will keep the seed from

falling out. Starting on one side, loosely roll the paper towels toward the other side (like rolling up a rug) and place a rubber band around the roll. Finally, place the roll in a plastic bag. Seal, but not completely, so as to keep moisture in but still allow some air into the bag. Now, place the bag upright at room temperature for five to seven days.

After five to seven days, remove the sample from the bag and unroll the towels. Count and record the number of healthy seedlings (adequate root and shoot development).
