Oberlin Arts and Humanities Commission will present Marla Matkin in a program at 6 p.m. (Mountain Time) on Saturday, Sept. 29, at the Oberlin Gateway Center.

Matkin is a lifelong Kansan whose great-grandparents homesteaded in southwest Kansas in the 1870's. She will present "Cattle Towns and Soiled Doves," a story of early Kansas history, cattle drives and the excitement of life lived on the edge of the frontier.

A great crowd was on hand as the Goodland Rotary Club met for their regular weekly meeting at noon on Friday in the meeting room at Northwest Kansas Technical College. President Jenifer Sanderson called the meeting to order. Among the guests visiting Rotary was Jordan Casale, the new IT Director for the City of Goodland.

The Goodland Rotary Club continues to grow as the club officially welcomed another new member, Ryan Hembree, Manager of the Goodland Wal-Mart. Although Ryan has been attending Rotary for several months, he was officially

inducted into the club and received his Rotary pin.

After the meal and singing, Sanderson turned the meeting over to the Rotarian of the Day, Doug Sederstrom. Doug's guest speaker was Patrick Gleason, DC with Gleason Chiropractic in Goodland. Gleason is the Sports Medicine Team Physician for Goodland High School, and Sports Medicine Consultant for Northwest Tech. Gleason's program centered on concussions, and the lack of research and reporting of concussions that is taking place in the medical and athletic institutions. He said that the CDC

estimates there are 1.6 to 3.8 million sports and recreation related Traumatic Brain Injuries annually and probably that many more that are not reported or detected. Gleason discussed the symptoms and diagnosing of concussions as well as the treatment. State governments, colleges and school districts are beginning to work harder to protect young athletes from head injuries, as well as better initial evaluations of suspected concussions. Gleason said parents and citizens are the ones who need to help bring more awareness to the issue through education and advocacy.

After the weekly drawing, the Goodland Rotary meeting was adjourned. The next weekly gathering of the Rotary Club will be Friday September 21 at noon in the Tech College meeting room. Visitors, and those interested in joining Rotary are always welcome to attend.
