

Girls golf teams win, place second Monday

It was divide and conquer for the Goodland High School varsity girls golf team on Monday. The Cowgirls split into two teams, winning the Russell tournament and placing second at Colby.

Both varsity tournaments were at the same time Monday, so the team split up to attend both.

At Russell, the girls placed first with a team score of 198. Russell got second with 210; Bennington, 221; Larned, 223; Hoisington, 228; Concordia, 235; and Thomas More Prep-Marian, 251.

In individual scores, Logan Perryman placed second with 46; Cortney Cowan, fourth with 48; Megan Siruta, fifth with 49; and Jordan Knitig, 10th with 53. Kristi Stasser shot a 60.

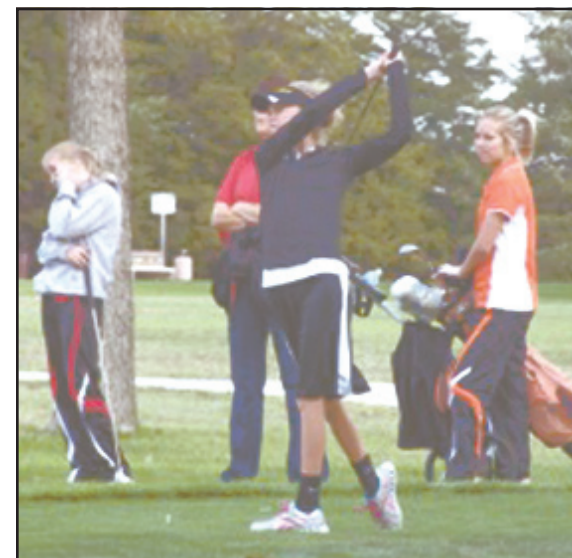
"Russell is known for their water holes," said coach Connie Livengood. "It was cool there and breezy but the girls putted well and their approach shots were better."

In Colby, the girls placed second with 210 behind Colby, who won their home tournament with 193.

In individuals scores, Katie Hays and Emily Purvis were tied with several girls at 49. Hays ended up in third place and Purvis in fifth.

Dani Mangus shot a 55; Dayne Webring, 57; Milan Brannick, 59; and Sarah Johnson, 82.

In the junior varsity division, Breanna Garrett got first place with 65; and Cienna Brannick, fifth place

The Goodland High School varsity volleyball team swept its triangular on Thursday, downing both Stratton, Neb. and Norton.

The varsity girls team placed sixth out of six teams with 137.

Laci Siruta placed third with 17:06; Sierra Estes, 21st with 19:05; Lindsey Geeska, 34th with 20:21; Teryn Tompkins, 39th with 22:16; and Kylee Samuelson, 40th with 23:12.

On the Grant Junior High squad, Erin Floyd medaled, placing ninth with 15:14. Kellie Archer ran an 8:53 mile and Austin Keim ran a 19:26 two-mile.

Next action for the cross country teams will be at 2:30 p.m. (Mountain Time) Tuesday, Oct. 2, at Ellsworth.
