

### City commission still in discussions over water project

kbottrell@nwkansas.com Despite voting down a proposal for a private audit of Goodland's utility system, the city commission continued to debate a possible water project at the regular meeting on Sept. 17.

Gerber said the initial discussion had begun when water department head Rich Simon had sat down with engineering firm EBH and drew up a line replacement project for 57 blocks and \$3.2 million.

Simon said the city already knows where some leaks are, mainly on Sherman and Kansas Avenues, but there could be lots more.


Commissioner Bill Finley asked if the city could do an internal audit. Simon said the city doesn't have the leak detection equipment
