# Tech College featured by Apple

kbottrell@nwkansas.com Northwest Kansas Technical College is getting national recognition after a film crew created several promotion videos for Apple highlighting the iPad program.

Radical Media, an international company that produces films, commercials, television shows and music videos, sent a production team to the college last year. Filming took place at the end of August, 2011. The film features several Northwest Tech departments using the iPads in their daily classwork as well as interviews with students and staff.

The film crew was impressed with how

"When they were in our department they said they liked it here because of the handson,"Goodwin said."They were really excited about the visual; it wasn't just kids sitting in front of computers."

'We've had the iPad for three years now, we're getting kind of good at it," said Diesel Instructor Greg Unger, who's diesel mechanics program was one of the programs featured in the video. "They were interested in how we use the iPads in hands-on work. We're using the iPad in a way they had never intended."

Unger said testing is all done using the iPad, and companies are increasingly making techthe college uses the iPad, said Automotive nical manuals available on the device. John class, he said.

Deere in particular is going to the iPad for its manuals, he said. Any procedures the students do in the shop can be sent to the instructors, and students also use the iPad to look up parts, record progress and video lectures or repair procedures.

"It frees me up," he said. "If they need to go back over something they can watch the ideo.'

Unger said there are tons of apps applicable to diesel mechanics, such as one that can create a virtual engine, which students can take apart and put back together. The new ways to use the device that each class comes up with are often used in teaching the next year's

The college has continued to advance its use of the iPad after the film was made, said Brad Bergsma, chief information officer.

"Watching the video, it's amazing how much we had progressed since then," he said. "They came back out and were impressed with our progress.'

The college has a faculty that is driven to find new ways to use technology, Bergsma said. The culture on campus has also helped, Bergsma said, since the college instructors are mainly people with industry experience who would know about tailoring new technology to real world applications.
