

October is National Breast Cancer Awareness Month. Since the program began in 1985, it has been dedicated to increasing awareness of breast cancer issues, especially the importance of early detection. Finding breast cancer early is the best strategy for successful treatment. The American Cancer Society suggests that around age 35, women should get a baseline mammogram and starting at the age of 40, women should have a yearly mammogram and clinical breast exam. The society also recommends that women should start doing a monthly breast self-exam in their 20s and have a clinical breast exam every three years.

Goodland Regional Medical Center encourages women to take advantage of this reminder and schedule a mammogram. The imaging process takes less than 30 minutes and is relatively painless. Results are normally received by the patient in 7 to 14 days after the exam.

"If all women age 40 and older took advantage of early detection methods - mammography plus clinical breast exam-breast cancer death rates would drop much further," said Jackie Jorgensen, nurse practitioner at Goodland Family Health Center. "The key to mammography screening is that it be done routinely - once in conjunction with a clinical breast exam. Mammography alone cannot always detect breast cancer."

The regional tournament is Monday at Larned.

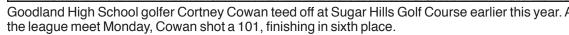

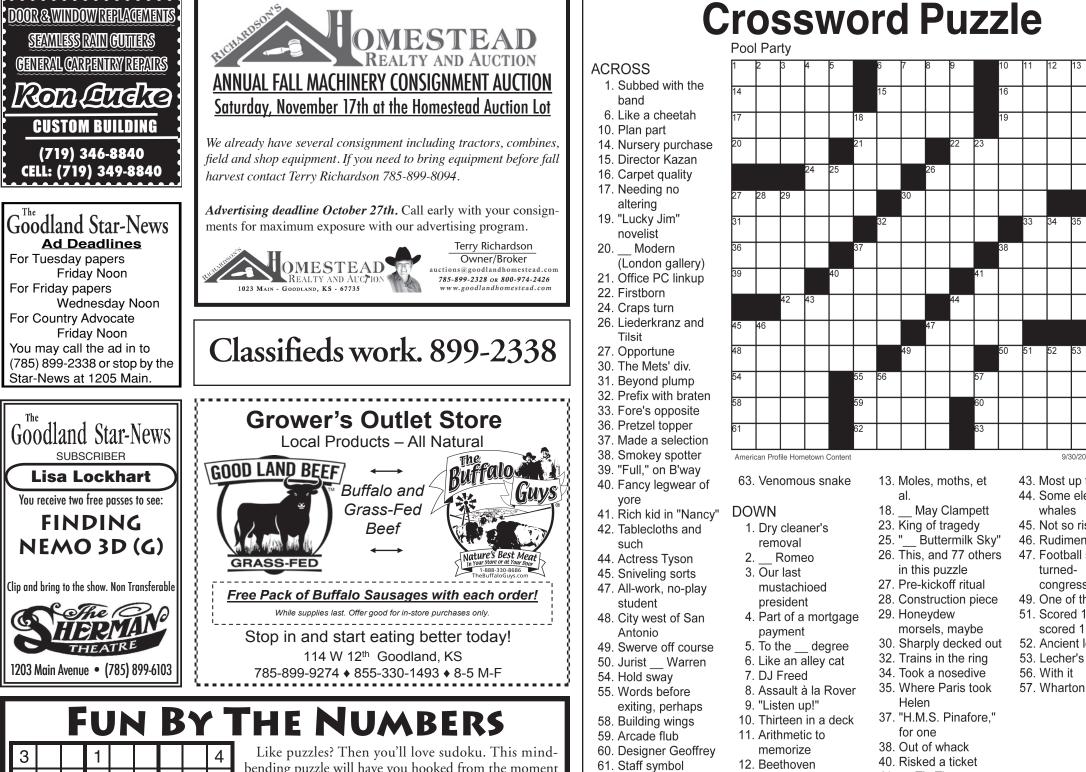
"I'm really proud of these girls for outscoring some of the other teams," Livengood said. "They have all improved so much this year.'

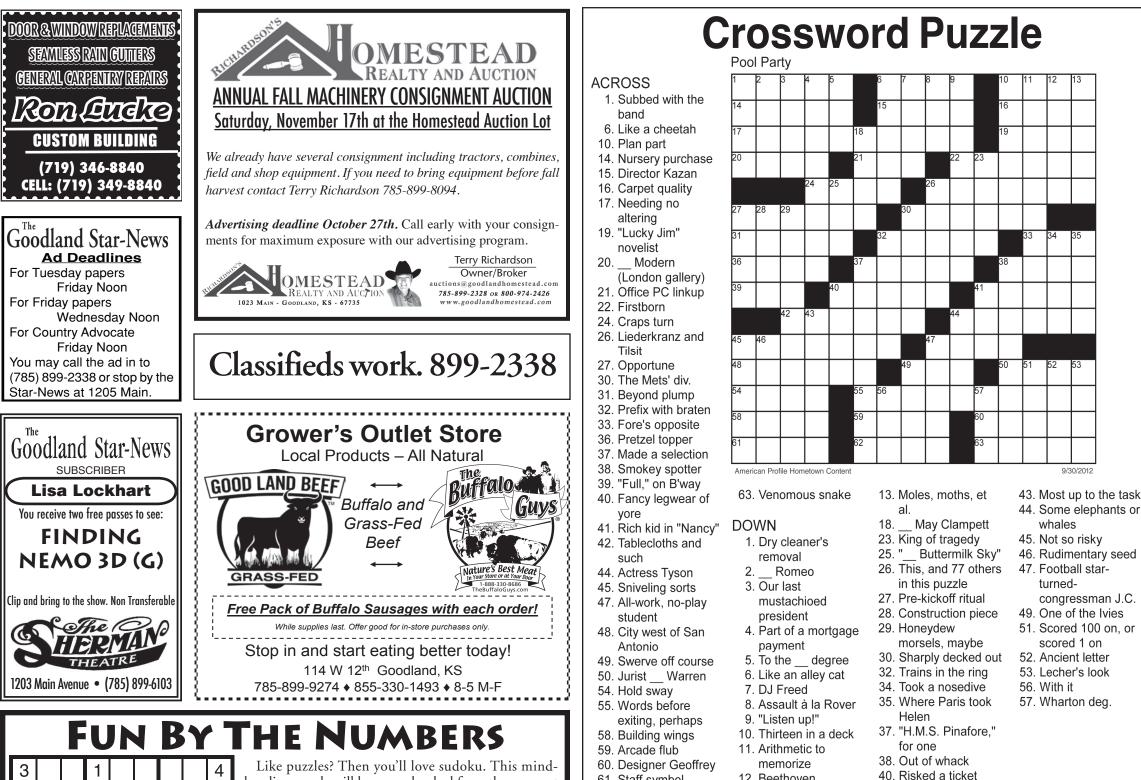
