Sherman County shares its appraiser with several other counties. Ballard informed the county commissioners of his plans at their meeting Wednesday. He said his retirement will be effective July 1, but said he still plans to work part time as the Rawlins County Appraiser. "I really enjoyed my time here,"

he said. Finding a new appraiser will be
