Department to clarify regs

The Kansas Department of Agriculture is re-proposing proposed K.A.R. 9-7-4, related to Trichomoniasis testing requirement for cattle in Kansas, to clarify the types of bulls to which the intrastate testing will apply. The department originally published a notice of hearing on the proposed Trichomoniasis regulation in the Sept. 27 Kansas

Trichomoniasis is a disease that results in infertility in cows and heifers. The disease can be economically devastating to affected herds and is a major concern of the Kansas cattle industry. To address the issue, the department created a working group including cattle farmers and ranchers, industry partners and veterinarians from across the state. The proposed regulation is a result of the working group's recommendations.

The proposed regulation will require any non-virgin bull, bull 10-months of age or older or bull of unknown virginity status that changes ownership in Kansas by private sale, public sale, lease, trade or barter but does not go directly to slaughter, be certified negative for Trichomoniasis. Previously, this certification was only required for bulls being imported into Kansas from other states.

The regulation is being proposed to clarify that the new intrastate testing requirements were intended to apply to bulls 10-months of age or older and bulls of unknown virginity status in addition to non-virgin bulls. The new, re-proposed regulation is available online at Kansas Department of Agriculture's website.

Kansas Department of Agriculture will host a public hearing on the proposed regulation at 10 a.m. on Thursday, Jan. 10, in the fourth floor training room of the Kansas Department of Agriculture, 109 S.W. 9th, Topeka. This hearing replaces the originally scheduled hearing that was to be held Tuesday, Nov. 27.

The department is accepting

written comments on the proposed regulation until Jan. 10. All interested parties may submit written comments to the Secretary of Agriculture, 109 S.W. 9th, 4th floor, Topeka, Kan. 66612 or by emila at leslei.garner@Kansas Department of Agriculture.ks.gov. Additionally, interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally at the hearing.
