

Reader Recipes

Italian Vegetable Soup

Ingredients

- 1 lb. ground beef • 1 cup sliced carrots
- 1 can tomato sauce 5 tsp. bouillon
- 1/2 tsp. oregano • 2 cups shredded cabbage
- parmesan cheese
- 1 cup diced onions

1 cup green beans

- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 can red kidney beans 1 tbsp. sweet basil
- 1 tbsp. parsley
- 1 cup sliced celery
- 1 can tomatoes, 16 oz.
- 2 cups water
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. black pepper 1/2 cups elbow macaroni

Brown beef in large heavy kettle, drain, add all the ingredients except cabbage, green beans and macaroni. Bring to boil. Lower heat; cover and simmer 20 minutes. Add cabbage, green beans and macaroni; bring to a boil and simmer until vegetables are tender. If you prefer a thinner soup, add additional water or broth. Sprinkle with parmesan cheese when served.

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
